Notice to Gas Consumers.

Yearly customers who have on Oct. 1, 1891, one or more stoves attached to the line will be charged the following rates per month for gas:

Heater No. 0	\$1.50	Net \$1.35
1	2.50	2.25
2	3.00	2.70
Cook Stove (Jet) No. 3	3.00	2.70
Heater No. 4	5.00	4.50
5	7.00	6.30

Heaters and cook stoves which have been disconnected during the summer, and are not connected to the line on or before Oct. 15, will be rated (net) thus:

For cook stoves and No. 2 heaters, \$3.00 per month; for No. 0, \$1.60; No. 1, \$2.60; and if not connected to the line until Nov. 1, an additional charge of 25 cents per month will be made on stoves connected for each subsequent month.

To all customers who do not use gas for fuel, but only for lighting, the rate, for each light, will be 25 cts. per month, and shall not be allowed to be used for heating.

In order to take advantage of the above rates (net), all monthly gas bills must be paid on or before the 10th day of each month.
