New Cheese Factory.

Mr. John L. Coyle, has leased the land from Conrad Mingus, and will commence at once to build a Cheese Factory on what is known as the Mingus and Casey's four corners, in the town of Andover; about three miles southwest of the village of Andover, and one and one half miles north of Fulmer Valley P. O., on the Andover and West Union mail route. Mr. Coyle has already secured the promise of 221 cows and probably 70 more when the factory is built. A few of the patrons present at the last meeting, subscribed \$50. toward the erection of the Factory; they have also volunteered to assist in the hauling of the building material and other necessary fixtures free of charge. Mrs. Alpheus Stillman, who has been very ill for several months past is reported as able to do her household work.

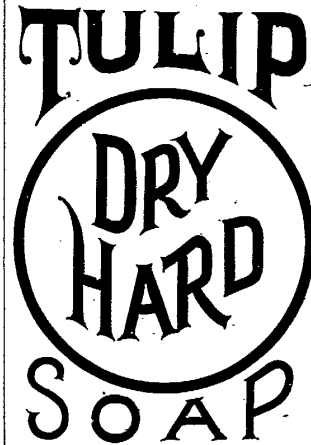
