Gen. Benj. F. Butler, who was for about a third of a century one of the most picturesque figures in American politics, and who was regarded as one of the ablest lawyers of the country, died in Washington last Wednesday morning of heart disease, after about an hour's illness.

The World's Fair Temperance Headquarters, at Chicago, which has been so widely noticed, was burned on the evening of January 9. Within sixteen hours after the flames were out, lumber was already being placed upon the site and plans were on foot for rebuilding. The loss is largely covered by insurance. The office of the Headquarters at 161 La Salle St., Chicago, has been flooded with letters from the guests who have engaged lodgings in advance, and without exception it is the declared purpose of its patrons, as well as the plans of its promoters, to stand by the enterprise and make it even a larger success, than at any time before proposed, notwithstanding its misfortune.

Public interest in the Quarantine bill has been transferred to the House since the Senate passed the bill without a division, but not without an earnest effort to pile up amendments on the bill. This bill is in some respects one of the most remarkable that was ever passed by the U. S. Senate, although it does not, as some have supposed, actually establish a system of National quarantine; but it gives the President more authority than was ever exercised by a President. He may, if the bill becomes a law, whenever in his discretion it is necessary to keep out contagious or infectious diseases, not only suspend immigration for any period not to exceed one year, but he can also suspend the importation of merchandise from infected countries. The authority to take possession of State property when it becomes necessary to use the same for quarantine purposes, without the consent of the State authorities, gives the National government all the power it could exercise under a National quarantine law.

The bill will probably become a law in substantially its present form.
