The Influenza.—As we are told that we are again to see something of our unwelcome visitor the grip this winter, a few hints, says a writer in the Tribune, may not be amiss about the preventives which have been found most efficacious in-arresting the spread of the contagion. Physicians seem at last to have arrived at the conclusion that this type of influenza "is an eminently infectious complaint, communicable in the ordinary personal relations of individuals one with another." It becomes the duty of every one (and of housekeepers in particular) to prevent the spread of the disease. In the first place, every part of the house must be in perfect sanitary condition. Let every drain be thoroughly examined, and inaugurate a frequent use of disinfectants. It is needless to say that the cleaner a house is kept, and the freer from all accumulations of refuse of all kinds, the better. If any member of the family is attacked by the grip, separate him at once from the rest of the household, and be careful that nothing that he uses or touches comes in contact with the others. Now that we recognize the terribly exhaustive nature of the disease, we are much better able than formerly to cope with the severe after effects which have in so many cases proved far worse than the illness itself. One great preventive of the after-trouble is to take extra food between regular meal times, a glass of warm milk, for example, or a fresh egg beaten up in a cup of tea. Growth of the Oyster.

The oyster at the commencement of its career is so small that 2,000,000 would only occupy a square inch. In six months each individual oyster is large enough to cover half a crown piece. The oyster is its own architect, and the shell grows as the fish inside grows, being never too small. ever too small.

It also-bears its age upon its back, and it is as easy to tell the age of an oyster by looking at its shell as it is that of horses by looking at their teeth.

Every one who has handled an oyster shell must have noticed the successive layers overlapping each other.

These are technically termed shots, and each one marks a year's growth, so that by counting them the age of the oyster can be determined.

Up to the time of its maturity—that is, when four years of age—the shots are regular and successive; but after that time they become irregular and are piled one upon another, so that the shell becomes bulky and thickened.

Fossil oysters have been seen of which each shell was nine inches thick, whence they may be guessed to be more than 900 years old.

One to two million oysters are produced from a single parent, and their scarcity is accounted tor by the fact that man is not the only oyster eating animal.

The startish loves the oyster and preys upon it unceasingly. A variety of whelk is also very fond of the young oysters, to get at which it bores right through the shell and sucks the fish up through the hole thus made.—[Buffalo Express.

The Vicious Rivers of China.

The St. Petersburg Gazette, referring to the latest inundation of the Yellow river in northern China, which will again bring a population of more than a million upon the point of starvation, points out that these frequent or periodical calamities are the work of man rather than the startent way were continued as the cal calamities are the work of man rather than of nature. It is doubtful whether the river could be turned back into its old bed, lying dry at present. But if it could, the old bed has been changed so much in the course of centuries that even there, in its old, natural, and wonted haunts, the current of the river might not become tranquil, but he forced to produce periodical inundations as it does in its present course.
