The cholera is almost certain to be knocking at the doors of this country for admission in the spring. It has not been effectually stamped out in Europe, and will probably increase with warm weather.

The death of James G. Blaine occurred last Friday morning at 11 o'clock. He was without doubt the most distinguished citizen of the American Republic who has passed away within a generation. The account of the funeral services over his body will be found on an inside page of the News this week.

One of the most interesting questions before this congress is the admission of new states to the union. Four territories—Arizona, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Utah—are claiming through their citizens, sent to Washington for that purpose, that they possess all of the requisites for statehood, and indeed, some that were not required of others earlier admitted to the family of states. The house has already passed bills for the admission of the first two, and the bill admitting the last has been favorably reported and will in all probability be passed by the house on the first suspension day. If parties and politics did not enter the question it would be perfectly safe to predict that four more states would be added to the Union before the 4th of March.

The following is reported to be President Cleveland's announcement of his policy: "The next administration will be a business man's administration. By that, I mean that business men are to have the preference in the appointments. Of course, the business men will be Democrats, but in making the appointments I shall consider the business records of the applicants. That will have greater weight with me than the endorsements of political organizations. I shall appoint such that I shall expect their policy to be carried out in all departments of the government. This is a time when business men are needed. The questions before the American people are questions that can best be solved by business men: Reforms in the tariff, economy in the government, will be easily accomplished, if plain, practical, honest business men are selected." This is quite in contrast with the recent utterance of the high-chief of Tammany, to the effect that business men have no business to hold offices.
