VICINITY NEWS.

A Few Things That Have Happened Lately Within Two or Three Hundred Miles of Here.

Teachers' Association at Friendship this week.

Jamestown has 150 manufactories employing 5,000 hands.

M. L. Rumpff & Co. will soon open a large clothing house in Angelica.

The Western New York Breeders' Association will meet in Hornellsville, Feb. 22 and 23.

The New York State Regents have granted a charter for a public library at the Belmont Union School.

Rev. Charles A. Kleeberger of Watertown has been engaged as pastor of the Broad street church of Wellsville.

The grand jury of Chenango county have condemned the jail located at Norwich. A new one will probably be built.

A bill has been introduced in the New York Legislature prohibiting the wearing of hoop-skirts. Similar bills have been introduced in Kentucky and Minnesota.

The boiler makers' strike in the Brooks Locomotive Works in Dunkirk has been declared off, and the strikers are applying for their old positions. As far as places can be made for them they will be taken back.

Philip Goyt, the noted centennarian of Mayville and the oldest man in Chautauqua county, died on Monday. He would have been 105 years old the 10th of next month. There was no disease but simply a wearing out.

A merchant of Carbondale, who is a connoisseur in matters of art, sent \$250 for a beautiful steel engraving of the landing of Columbus, in answer to an advertisement. Two days later he received a two cent Columbian postage stamp.

E. G. Hamlin, 60 years old, was shot Sunday evening by G. W. Morey, 63 years old, in a boarding house at Corning. It is said that Morey was jealous of Hamlin's attentions to his young wife. Morey is in jail. Hamlin's recovery is doubtful.

A standard metallic line is projected by the New York & Pennsylvania Telegraph and Telephone Company from Jamestown through Salamanca, Olean, Wellsville and Hornellsville to Elmira. Other improvements are also contemplated throughout the district this year.

One day last week as Mrs. Ida Hathaway of Hornellsville was driving a nail in the wall, she fell from the couch on which she was standing to a bed, breaking that down and seriously injuring herself internally. She is in a very precarious condition, and her recovery is very doubtful.

Mrs. Emily C. Woodruff has been ordained as pastor of the Congregational church of Little Valley. She is the third woman ever ordained by that denomination in this state. She has been conducting services in the Little Valley church since the death of her husband some months ago.

Deputy Sheriff Crawford of Forestville, Chautauqua county has been taken to the county jail in Mayville, on a charge of forgery. He was appointed deputy at Forestville by Sheriff Jenner. It is charged that he has not only forged notes, but that he even forged some of the names on the bond he gave the Sheriff.

An attempt was made to burn the home of E. H. Squares at Wellsville, last night. Kerosene oil had been thrown over the cellar door and one side of the house, and fired. The flames had partially consumed the door and blackened and charred the side of the dwelling, but it was too damp to burn. It is thought that the guilty party is a man named Geary whom Squares refused to lodge the night previously.

A dispatch from Rochester says it is reported that the production of salt from the Western New York mines will be materially reduced for the next two years. Fifty mine owners are holding a conference in Rochester, the effect of which it is said will be a uniform reduction of the output. For several years the salt producers have not worked in harmony and the profits have been small. The new combination will force up prices and do away with competition.

Stevens of Hornellsville, and that his case will be taken to the courts and pushed vigorously if the city authorities do not allow his claim, which there is very little prospect of their doing.
