At a meeting of the Allegany County Publishers' Association, held at Bolivar, April 29, 1892, the following rules were unanimously adopted to take effect the week beginning May 9, 1892:

Rule 1.—That not less than 5 cents per line be charged for resolutions of respect, and local notices of entertainments from which revenue is to be derived.

Rule 2.—Cards of thanks to be charged \$1.  
Rule 3.—Obituary notices, except such as are published as a matter of news, and lists of wedding presents to be charged for at not less than 5 cents per line.

### The Streets Named.

In conformity to law the Board of Trustees of Andover village met recently and named the streets of the village. The names of most of the streets are familiar to our readers, but we give them all, as follows: Main street, the principal thoroughfare; Dyke street, running east from Main, at the south end of village near Dyke creek; Greenwood street, running east from Main, past M. E. and Presbyterian churches; Centre street, running across Main, from depot to school house; Elm street, running east from Main, past Baptist and Catholic churches; Church street, running north from Greenwood, past Dr. Brainard's residence, to railroad bridge; Pleasant avenue, running east from Church, past W. W. Miller's; East Avenue, running north from Greenwood, past L. C. Van Fleet's; Water street, running north-east from Main, past tannery; Hill street, running north from Water, to Lever cemetery; Chestnut street, running west from Main, past Jas. O'Leary's, W. B. Hall's, etc.; West Greenwood street, running west from Main, continuation of Greenwood; First street, running south from Centre, past G. B. Herrick's, G. B. Proper's, etc.; Second street, running north from depot, past Mrs. Regan's, Abram Slocum's, etc.; Third street, running north from West Greenwood, past John McLaughlin's; Maple avenue, running west from First, past H. P. Benton's, H. D. Smith's, etc.; Baker street, running west from Main, past Baker farm, (road to Wellsville); Grove street, running northerly from Baker, past H. S. Smith's.
