FATHER MAHONEY.

Father Mahoney, our stalwart prohibition worker, issues a bi-weekly manifesto at St. Paul, Minn., and we wish it might be as ubiquitous as drink. It is an admirable little sheet to give away and full of convincing arguments against the liquor men's tactics and the high license fallacy. Here are some quotations: "One-half the amount of what is annually spent in drink in Ireland would, if applied for the purpose, buy, in fifteen years, all the farms in Ireland." "If we could make England sober we might shut up nine tenths of the jails." Cardinal McCabe of Dublin writes: "Intemperance is the source of nearly all our crimes and misfortunes. Ninety per cent. of all Irish crimes are traceable directly or indirectly, to drink. Must we have the drink always with us? Is there no remedy? The state alone can save us. The traffic smiles approvingly on moral suasion. Moral suasion leaves its work intact."

FATHER WALSH'S GOOD WORK.

The News man called on Rev. D. Walsh while in Buffalo a few days ago, and was most cordially received by the reverend gentleman. As is well known in Andover, Father Walsh has charge of the Working Boys' Home in that city, and his other duties which keep his time well occupied. The Home is situated on Niagara Square, one of the most beautiful spots in the city, surrounded at one time by residences of men representing much of the wealth of the city, and now containing many historic buildings and homes. The Working Boys' Home is a well arranged building, scarcely large enough to accommodate the demands made upon it. The property is free from debt, and comprises considerable land in addition to that upon which the building stands. Father Walsh informed us that the society has in contemplation a much wider and more beneficial field of work than that now occupied, to be carried on in connection with that done at present. The plan is nothing less than the erection of a new building which shall be used as a place of evening resort by young men employed in the city who have no homes except unattractive boarding houses, and who are open to the temptations of the saloon and other places of questionable character. The building will be fitted with reading rooms, gymnasiums, billiard rooms, etc., and will furnish ample recreation and amusement, with none of the evil influences which are so easily found in a large city. Father Walsh will have the best wishes of his Andover friends for the accomplishment of his good work, and it is to be hoped it will be pushed to a speedy realization.

At the Working Boys' Home are now held meetings at frequent intervals, at which lectures, etc., are provided for the instruction of the audience, which generally includes many citizens of Buffalo of greater or less prominence. One of the recent lecturers was Judge Hatch of Buffalo, formerly of Allegany county. His subject was "The Crucifixion of Jesus Christ from a Legal Standpoint," and Father Walsh was loud in his praises of the lecture, which he said contains much valuable information. He informed us that Judge Hatch contemplated the delivery of this lecture at Alfred Centre in the not distant future.

We are under obligations to Father Walsh for favors shown us while in the city. He accompanied us to many places of interest, including the city hall, Catholic Cathedral, etc., and gave us glimpses of many places of great interest to which a stranger usually has no access.

Death of Treasurer Gardiner.

Daniel Dennison Gardiner, treasurer of Allegany county died at his home in Angelica at 1 o'clock Sunday afternoon. He has been treasurer of Allegany county continuously since the year 1854, the longest period this important office has been continuously held by any man in the history of this state. He performed the duties of his office to within a few days, when prostrated by illness. In this period of 38 years he handled more than \$7,000,000 of public money and not one penny ever went wrong. He was the personification of integrity. He was in courtesy, an ideal public servant. He was a life long Republican in politics, Episcopalian in religion and Royal Arch Mason. His death is universally regretted throughout Allegany county.

He was born in Eaton, Madison county, 69 years ago, March 2, next. He went to Angelica with his father when 12 years old. A widow, son and daughter survive him, the son living in Buffalo and the daughter at Harrisville.

Mich. A brother, Col. Curtis Gardiner, lives in St. Louis. Mr. Gardiner was a descendant of Lion Gardiner, of Gardiners Island, New York.

The funeral will be held Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock, and will be in charge of the Masonic fraternity.

PATRICIDE IN BELMONT!

Martin Reilly Fatally Beats His Father and Escapes—Officers on His Track.

Last Saturday afternoon, Martin Reilly of Belmont, who recently returned from the Buffalo Workhouse engaged in a fight with his father, John Reilly, an elderly man. Martin, finding his fists not sufficiently powerful for his purpose, took a hammer and beat his father in the side, on the head, and in directed sounds on different parts of the body. The old gentleman received injuries from which he died Tuesday afternoon at 3 o'clock p. m. About the time of his death, Martin, who had not been arrested, took leg bail across the fields. Deputy Sheriff Johnson was soon on his track and followed him some distance toward the Vandemark creek. Mr. Johnson made up his mind that the fugitive intended to strike some point on the Erie road where he could catch a freight train, Reilly having been formerly employed as a brakeman on this road.

The officer returned to Belmont and took train 18 for Tip Top. Sheriff Sherman was on the same train bound for Hornellsville in search of the man. Deputy Sheriff Noble of Wellsville was also on the lookout for him along the line. Up to the time of this writing we have not learned that the man has been taken. He will probably be overhauled soon, as his identification will be easy by reason of a wound on his upper lip, covered with a wide strip of court plaster. The wound was caused by his father's teeth during the fracas.

LATER—REILLY CAUGHT.

Reilly was caught late last night at Cuba, hiding in a box car, probably intending to take a trip west. He was taken to Belmont for examination.
