A student of comparative politics points out the fact that the government of the United States is among the oldest of civilized governments now existing in the world, since most European countries have been to a considerable degree revolutionized since the first election of George Washington to the Presidency. The French republic, the present German empire and the Italian kingdom, considered as political entities, are but youngsters beside the century-old American republic.

Grover Cleveland will be inaugurated as President this week Saturday. Here are a few pointers from the program: Grover Cleveland's inaugural address as President of the United States for four years from March 4th next will contain about 1700 words, and will be more general than specific in character. Mr. Cleveland has carefully written out what he desires to say, but will speak at the inauguration without manuscript, only referring to topical notes to refresh his memory. The address will express Mr. Cleveland's profound gratitude to the people for the honor thus a second time conferred upon him as a mark of confidence in him and belief in the principles upon which he was elected. His utterances upon the financial policy, tariff and economic administration will be decisive and frank. Confidence in Democratic principles as able to deal with the problems of labor and capital, sectional divisions and political unrest will be expressed. The abolition of Federal interference in elections in the States, will, it is said, be treated as a recognized decision of the people. The pension department, the new navy, a rigorous quarantine and the regulation of immigration will probably receive attention. The President may not refer openly to the question of annexation of Hawaii, but will take a conservative stand on the subject and not act hastily.

Mr. and Mrs. Cleveland will go at once to the Executive Mansion after the inauguration and not to any private residence, as has been misrepresented. President Harrison has had the White House put in admirable condition. He has been in correspondence with Mr. Cleveland and the latter greatly appreciates the kind, provident and hospitable spirit which the retiring President has shown for the comfort of the family of the incoming Executive. Mr. Cleveland and President Harrison will ride to and from the inauguration ceremonies together.

Mr. Cleveland's first veto was sent in against the arrangements that he should be driven from the Capitol to the White House behind four black horses in white harness with an outrider on each. This did not accord with Mr. Cleveland's Jeffersonian ideas and the veto on it was quick and decisive.

Stan Away With a Postoffice.

The charge of running off with a postoffice has been made against J. D. Ring, deputy postmaster of West Greece, Monroe county. Charles V. Babcock is the postmaster at that place and Ring his deputy. The postoffice has been located for several years in a hotel, but Ring was anxious to have it elsewhere to suit the convenience of himself and friends. So last Saturday, during the absence of his chief, he loaded up the entire outfit and removed it to a place about one-half mile west.

When the Postmaster returned he found his occupation gone. He then went to see the deputy who was safely ensconced in his new quarters, and was informed that that the office has been moved by consent of the postoffice department. Mr. Babcock drove to the city yesterday and consulted the postmaster here. Afterward he secured a warrant for the arrest of Ring from U. S. Commissioner Gilbert.

Mr. Whittlesy, assistant postmaster of Rochester says an offense against the law had been committed, unless Ring had the permission of the postoffice department, which is doubted, but there does not seem to be penalty attached to it. He said it certainly was a new thing for a man to walk off with a whole postoffice.
