TOWN MEETINGS.

FULL REPUBLICAN TICKET ELECTED IN ANDOVER.

131 MAJORITY AGAINST LICENSE.

Republicans carried the Town Election in Andover yesterday by majorities ranging from 40 to 106, and the town was carried against license by the unprecedented majority of 131 votes. Below we give the vote for each candidate and the pluralities for the successful ones:
