RULE 1.—That not less than 5 cents per line be charged for resolutions of respect, and local notices of entertainments from which revenue is to be derived.

RULE 2.—Cards of thanks to be charged \$1.

RULE 3.—Obituary notices, except such as are published as a matter of news, and lists of wedding presents to be charged for at not less than 5 cents per line.

Several cases of scarlet fever in town. None of them are serious, with the possible exception of one case, but the Board of Health has deemed it best to close the school, churches, and other places of public gathering. With this wise precaution there is but little doubt that the disease will soon be stamped out.

The annual financial statement of the Board of Village Trustees appears in this issue. As will be seen, there is a balance in the treasury of \$84.95. Last year the taxes were not as high as they were previous to incorporation, and the work that has been done under the direction of the Trustees speaks for itself. The streets are in good condition, a lookout has been built, many crosswalks have been put down, a large number of new street lamps have been put up, and there is the sum of \$84.95 towards next year's expenses. This balance, together with the absence of a lookout fund next year, will still further reduce taxation. The Board of Trustees have done a great deal of work, they have done it well, and we believe they are entitled to a vote of thanks from the people of this village for their unremunerated efforts. To Mr. Abram Slocum, Street Commissioner, is due the statement that he has been a faithful and competent official, and has labored hard in carrying out the plans outlined by the Trustees.

County Judge S. M. Norton has appointed Charles Ricker of Fillmore to the vacancy caused by the death of Daniel D. Gardiner, Allegany County Treasurer. Mr. Ricker is a hardware merchant, well known throughout the county.
