

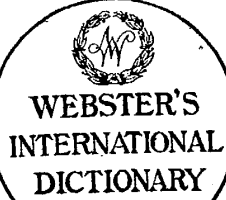

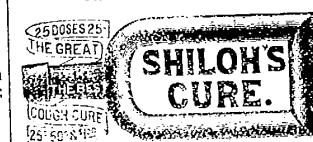

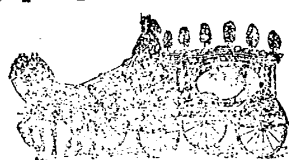

Train Twelve Wrecked.

Last Thursday morning Erie train No. 10 ran into the rear of train 12 at Lackawaxen. The rear sleeper on 12 was totally demolished and every passenger in the car was injured, a few seriously. Something was wrong with train twelve's engine and it is stated that no flag was sent back to warn number 10, which was following.

New Firm in Wellsville.

Not the Slightest Cause for Alarm.

It has been reported in neighboring villages that a serious epidemic of scarlet fever is raging in Andover; that several deaths have occurred; and that the whole town is practically quarantined. There is no truth whatever in these reports. Not a single death has occurred from scarlet fever in this town within the past year, and every case thus far has been exceptionally light. Those patients who have not already recovered are in a fair way to do so, and no person has had reason for the slightest alarm. It is true that the schools and churches were closed for a brief period, but this was done more as a precaution against possible trouble than from any present danger. It was known that many children had been exposed to the disease, and it was thought best to prohibit all public gatherings until the result of the exposure should be apparent. It is needless to add that Andover is free from an epidemic of any kind, unless it may be the "post-office fever," and visitors are quite as likely to catch that as they are to contract scarlet fever. Neither disease has as yet given the undertaker a job, and there is no prospect of any such result.

Fight in Potter County.

The details of a pitched battle fought last week Tuesday in the wilds of Potter county, Pa., near a lumber-camp known as Cowley Run, are just received. Three brothers named Edwards had been left in charge of George Smith's property while he was away attending to business. Before leaving, Smith gave two brothers named Rees, in the same vicinity, permission to get some lumber near the Edwards brothers' camp, of which the Edwards knew nothing. They would not allow the lumber to be moved by Rees, whereupon a squabble ensued and the Edwards were victorious. The Rees boys retired to another camp, reinforced with cant-hooks and clubs, and with several others, numbering about 12 in all, preceeded to take the lumber by force. A battle took place that lasted over an hour. Frank Edwards was struck with a club, fracturing his skull at the base of the brain, which undoubtedly will prove fatal. Others received bad cuts and bruises. Two of the Rees party have been arrested and warrants are out for the arrest of others. William Rees, who struck Edwards, it is reported, cannot be found.

Corporation Caucus and Election.

The citizens' caucus was held last Thursday evening, to nominate candidates for village offices. One hundred and nineteen votes were cast and the old officers were all renominated. For President P. Cannon received 83 votes on the first formal ballot and was declared nominated. The other nominations followed with one ballot on each. The ticket was as follows:

For President—Patrick Cannon.
For Trustee—A. M. Burrows.
For Treasurer—W. B. Bundy.
For Collector—Calvin Slocum.

At the election on Tuesday the vote was light, but one ticket being in the field. One hundred and fifteen votes were cast, the different candidates receiving from 102 to 110 votes each.

The re-election of the old officers under the conditions which existed must certainly be gratifying to each of them personally, as it shows their popularity and expresses satisfaction with their conduct of affairs during the past year. It is safe to say that their work during the year to come will be in the interest of Andover as a whole, and we believe our people may look for still further improvement in village affairs.

The Heaviest Lamb of All.

Feb. 17, '92, one of our ewes gave birth to a lamb that weighed 18½ lbs. and is now owned by L. C. Bradley, of Ovid Centre, N. Y. We claim it is the heaviest lamb on record at birth.

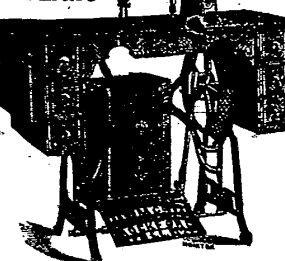
