Women are now allowed to vote for municipal officers in Kansas, and the registration for the municipal elections, which closed Friday night, was remarkable for the heavy registration of women. Thousands of them are now qualified and ready to vote at the elections which will be held in every city in the state on April 4th. In Kansas City the women have shown an unprecedented interest in municipal politics, and their vote will be a large factor in the election.

Assemblyman Smith's hoop-skirt bill came up in the Assembly Monday night and was ordered to a third reading. Mr. Sullivan offered an amendment making it unlawful to sell, give, loan or furnish to any citizen of this state what is known as a hoop skirt, "but any person may steal such, and if caught will not be punished." Another section of the bill he suggested should make it unlawful to manufacture hoop-skirts except out of barbed wire. Both of these amendments were solemnly rejected by the Assembly.

Perhaps you know it already, but if you do not you will be astonished to be told that in this intelligent republic, in the dying days of the 19th century there are living along the mountain ranges from Virginia to Alabama, 1,500,000 people "who have never received or written a letter and could not read one if it were printed and sent to them." They are not negroes either, but white people, with good old Scotch and Huguenot blood in their veins. Their ancestors came to this country in the colonial days.
