Rule 1.—That not less than 5 cents per line be charged for resolutions of respect, and local notices of entertainments from which revenue is to be derived.

Rule 2.—Cards of thanks to be charged \$1.

Rule 3.—Obituary notices, except such as are published as a matter of news, and lists of wedding presents to be charged for at not less than 5 cents per line.

Died.

Mrs. Maria Oatley died suddenly last Sabbath evening at the home of her son, W. Oatley, at the advanced age of 74 years. Mrs. Oatley had been in comparatively feeble health for some time, and yet was usually well up to Saturday night. About an hour after retiring it was discovered that she was unconscious from the effect of a paralytic stroke from which she did not recover in the least. Mrs. Oatley was born in Scott, Cortland county N. Y., in 1819, and was married to Almeron Oatley in 1836, removing soon after to Howard, Steuben Co., where she resided for 55 years. She had only come to live with her son in Andover during the last year. Mrs. Oatley was greatly beloved, not only in her family, but by all who had the pleasure of her acquaintance. Universal sympathy is expressed for her aged husband who mourns her.

The funeral services were held at the house Tuesday, Rev. G. M. Janes officiating. The burial took place in the Bundy cemetery.

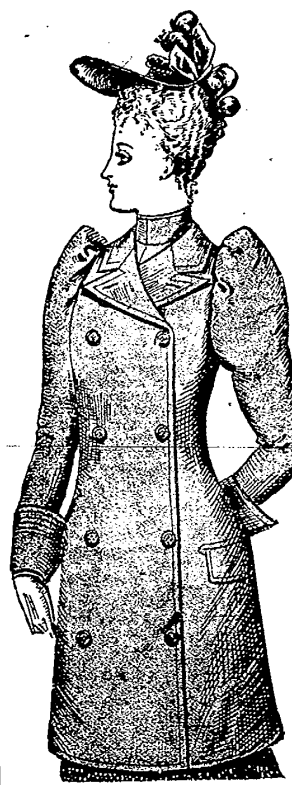
