Senator Edwards has made a long fight to secure the right of franchise for women at village elections. He has now given it up for the session. The Senate has twice voted on his bill and each time the Doctor has been short of enough votes to pass the measure. When the last effort was made he had 16 affirmative votes. One more would have passed the bill and sent it to the Assembly. Now anything the lower house might do would be futile, so those women who want to vote must wait another year at least. The result of Senator Edwards' efforts for female suffrage during his two years in the Senate has been to get a law made last year enabling women to vote for school commissioner.

THE TOWNSHIP SCHOOL SYSTEM.

Last week the Senate passed Senator Bloodgood's bill providing for the adoption of the township in place of the district school system. This important measure, which was recommended by Superintendent Crocker in his last annual report, has been given the most careful consideration by Senator Edwards and the other members of the Senate Committee on Public Instruction, and in its present form is acceptable to all who are directly interested in the change. The bill does not affect cities, school districts in two or more towns, or union free school districts. It provides that on the petition of 20 electors the question of adopting the township system shall be submitted to vote, and that, if adopted, a town school board of nine members, three of whom shall be elected each year, shall be chosen.

There are in the state 11,000 school districts which may be consolidated should each of the 1,000 towns take advantage of the provisions of the bill. Thus greater simplicity may be secured, together with an equalization of school taxation and school facilities. The report of the superintendent of public instruction for 1892 shows great inequality in school taxation under the present system.
