The Republicans of the counties of Allegany, Cattaraugus and Chautauqua have agreed upon the basis of representation which is to govern their senatorial conventions in the future. Each county is to be entitled to 15 delegates, to be chosen at a county convention.

Now the State also has an Agricultural department and will have a Commissioner of Agriculture, who will supersede the State Dairy Commissioner and will administer the agricultural interests of the State on the grander scale proposed by the Governor.

The high prices which potatoes have brought during the past season will doubtless so stimulate their production that the price will probably fall below the cost of production next fall. A writer in an agricultural paper suggests that the best plan for farmers to pursue is to obtain the earlier varieties of seed and plant them at the earliest opportunity so as to get their crop into the market before the main crop is ready to harvest. The soil of certain sections of this country is well adapted to raising the early variety of potatoes, and producers who pay attention to this variety will probably be the favored ones next fall.

The journey of the old Liberty bell from Philadelphia to Chicago will be a sort of triumphal march. The start was made yesterday, preceded by a great procession in Philadelphia, headed by the Mayor. The bell was then placed under a canopy on an open car and fenced around with 13 gold and silver posts. In this way it will be taken to its destination, which it is expected will be reached Friday night. Great demonstrations will be made at various places. At Indianapolis ex President Harrison will make a speech. Four policemen have been detailed to guard the historic relic during its six months' stay in Chicago.

Forty-five precious historical documents relating to the voyages and discovery of America are to be exhibited at the World's Fair. The Duke of Veragua, the living descendant of Columbus, has agreed to lend them. The 45 papers form almost a history of Columbus's career as discoverer. In the list is the original commission given to Columbus by Ferdinand and Isabella upon his departure for the first voyage. It is dated Granada, April 30, 1492. In it he is appointed grand admiral of the ocean seas, vice-king and governor general of all the lands he should discover. Every document in the collection is either written by Columbus or signed by Ferdinand or Isabella.

The failure of the Chinese Restriction act has been comically pitiable, maintains the New York Independent. The law required that within one year from the 5th of last May all Chinese laborers within the United States should take out registration papers and furnish photographs of themselves for the purposes of identification. The Internal Revenue Office issued the forms of applications for registry and distributed warning in the Chinese language, enjoining every Chinaman who wanted to remain in this country to register and bring his photograph. Out of 107,475 Chinese in the United States, according to the census, just five have registered and the rest have refused. The law required that those who refuse shall be sent back to China. To do it would cost over \$10,000,000, and the appropriation made to enforce the bill is only \$50,000. We imagine that the law is bound to fall into a state of innocuous desuetude.

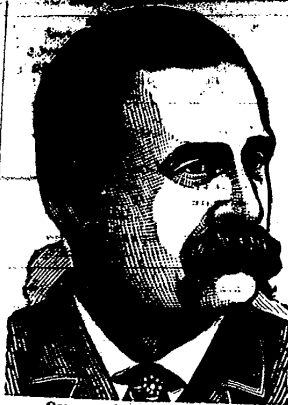
