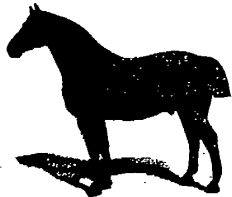

VICINITY NEWS.

A Few Things That Have Happened Within One or Two Hundred Miles of Here.

The Bolivar, Eldred & Cuba railroad will be no more. The work of taking up the rails between Wellsville and Eldred, a distance of 26 miles has begun. This winds up the narrow-gauge system in this section, and all the stockholders will have as a reminder of their investments will be their paper stock.

The appeal in case of Frace against the Erie railway has been decided in favor of Frace. The action was brought for burning the hotel at Seio against the railroad company, and he has a judgment for \$3,341.11 for damages. Hon. Clarence A. Farnum of Wellsville, was the successful attorney.

Rochester is to have a big dam up the valley. The State has appropriated \$17,500 for preliminary work and it is probable that actual work will commence next week. It is expected that when the dam is completed Rochester will have a sufficient supply of water all the year round, a constant force of 30,000 horse power being estimated. It is also expected that the dam will do away with the danger from spring freshets.

A Mayville, N. Y., lawyer, in search of a missing heir, became satisfied at last that the man he wanted was somewhere in Canada, but not knowing where, addressed a letter to him at every post-office in Ontario and Quebec—nearly 4600 of them in all. One of the letters reached his address, and, as his inheritance was more than \$100,000, he probably won't object to the item, "Postage, \$92," in the lawyer's little bill.

A few days ago the Climax Powder Company's dynamite factory located one mile and a half east of Emporium, Pa., was wrecked by an explosion of terrific force. Just what caused the explosion will probably never be known. Three employees who were at work on the premises were killed. The victims were Geo. C. Lyons, Wm. M. King and Frederick Badger. Mr. Lyons was literally torn to pieces, his remains being scattered in all directions. The bodies of the other victims were also horribly mangled.

One hundred years ago Charles Cameron, with a party of 30 adventurous spirits, arrived from the east and camped on what is now the site of Bath, N. Y. Cameron was so well pleased with the country that he set his men to work and before night they had staked out a village. His imagination led him to believe that he had founded what was destined to become the metropolis of the then far west, but his judgment was poor, as Bath contains to-day but 3,500 inhabitants. These, however, are getting things in readiness for a centennial celebration which will be held June 7th.

H. B. LaRue of Hornellsville sued a number of people in Hornellsville and Elmira for heavy damages for alleged conspiracy in having him arrested and placed in Willard Asylum. He claimed he was not insane. Among the defendants was Dr. Pilgrim of the asylum. The case was tried during the past week at Corning. The jury arrived at a verdict yesterday. It was no cause of action, which would indicate that Mr. LaRue's actions prior to his arrest convinced the jury that he was not right in his mind. The plaintiff says he will appeal the case, which has thus far cost him several thousand dollars.

Thomas Murray died at his home in Greenwood, Thursday, April 27, 1893. His age is reported as being one hundred years. He was born in Ireland and had been a resident of Greenwood 54 years. The funeral was held at the Church of the Blessed Sacrament in Andover Saturday morning, Rev. Father Griffin of Cuba officiating. The burial was at the old Catholic cemetery in Greenwood. Mr. Murray's wife died about a year ago. He leaves four children—Thomas, Bernard, Kate and Standish Murray.

Another Railroad.

The Wellsville Reporter says: President J. B. Rumsey of the Olean, Oswayo & Eastern Railroad, was in town this morning and purchased a bill of scrapers, shovels and tools for the construction gang on his new road. This line is to be 14 miles long and will run from Genesee Forks to Oswayo. It is in no wise a part of the W. C. & P. C. R.R. but will be operated in connection with the river road. The stock is mainly owned by Pres. Rumsey, W. W. Crittenden and other Oswayo parties. Work will commence at once and be hurried to completion.

Allegany Capital at Seneca Falls.

The Allegany county gentlemen who are interested in the new natural gas project at Seneca Falls are S. McArthur Norton, Herman Rice, Henry C. Wilcox, W. A. Hosley, A. R. Dougherty, all of Friendship, and Clarence A. Farnum, of Wellsville. The only other member of the company is Jasper N. Hammond of Seneca Falls. These gentlemen, after most careful and thorough investigation, have backed their opinions of the value of this prospective enterprise by a capitalization of \$25,000, and propose to inaugurate active operations as soon as the weather will permit. Cady Silsby of Seneca Falls, formerly of Belmont, was instrumental in bringing the opportunity for investment to the notice of the members of the company.

Funeral of Thomas McGrath.

The funeral of Thomas McGrath, whose death was announced in last week's News, was held at the Church of the Blessed Sacrament Saturday morning, Rev. Father Gardiner of Hornellsville officiating. The remains were taken to Wellsville for burial. Mr. McGrath had been sick since last fall, he having been out of the house but once since election day. He had lived in Andover 31 years, coming here from Cattaraugus county. He was universally respected, and was a good citizen. He leaves a wife and six children—John McGrath of Andover, Mrs. John Driscoll of Susquehanna, Mrs. John Barry of Philadelphia, Mrs. Frank Elliott of Rochester, Misses Anna and Jettie McGrath of Andover. Mrs. Barry was unable to be present at the funeral on account of sickness.

Arrested for Dehorning Cattle.

Last Saturday J. W. Middaugh, who gets his mail in Seio, but resides in the town of Friendship, was arrested for dehorning cattle. The warrant was procured by Wallace Seaman of Brooklyn, an agent of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals. The Society has lately been investigating the matter of dehorning cattle, and its officers have evidently arrived at the conclusion that there are good grounds for believing the process and results are cruel to the animals. Mr. Middaugh was taken before Justice Torrey in Wellsville and his attorney secured an adjournment to enable the defendant to apply for an order taking the case before the grand jury.

If it transpires that dehorning is cruel, about three-fourths of the farmers in this section of the State, as well as the officials in charge of the State experiment stations, are booked for a term in prison or the alternative of paying a fine. But if the matter comes before a grand jury of Allegany county farmers—well, that's different.
