"Grand, marvelous, incomprehensible," was the verdict of President Cleveland as expressed to President Higginbotham after his first visit to the World's Fair.

The naval review at New York last Thursday was a grand affair, and was witnessed by thousands of people, but we will venture the assertion that those who staid at home and read the daily papers know more about the affair than do those who depended on their own powers of observation.

Some of the county papers, as well as those outside, are "lapping it" to Assemblyman Congdon because he voted against what those papers thought was right on the great Buffalo "sneak bill." The Buffalo News says Mr. Congdon voted in favor of every rotten measure that came up in the Assembly. The Wellsville Reporter says Mr. Congdon explained satisfactorily his vote on a certain measure during his first term in the Assembly, and intimates that an explanation in regard to his vote on the Buffalo bill will now be in order. Without regard to the merits of the bill in question Mr. Congdon certainly did not vote with the majority of his fellow-Republicans, and his vote in favor of the bill was thus cast despite the earnest protests of the Republican leaders in the Assembly. It shouldn't be necessary for Albany's Member to begin "explaining" his actions immediately upon his return from Albany.

The only bill affecting taxation passed by the last Legislature was Senator Parson's bill providing that the real property of a corporation or association organized exclusively for the moral and mental improvement of men and women, or for religious, charitable, missionary, hospital, educational, patriotic, historical or cemetery purposes, and used exclusively for carrying out thereupon one or more of such purposes, shall be exempt from taxation. Subsequent provisions of the bill limit the exemption to associations organized in good faith for such purposes and to the real property actually used therefor. If a portion of a building only is used, only the value of that portion is exempt from taxation, the remaining portion being subject to taxation. If church property is owned by a bishop for church purposes the property is exempt the same as if owned by a church. The bill when it first reached the Governor or exempted from taxation the property of Young Men's Christian Associations and the National Catholic Union, but at the Governor's request the bill was made general in its provisions.
