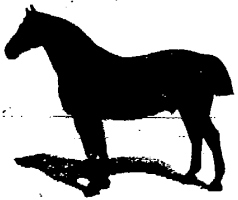

VICINITY NEWS.

A Few Things That Have Happened Within One or Two Hundred Miles of Here.

A Judge in Mt. Morris last week delivered a charge by telephone to a jury in Corning.

Prof. D. A. Blakeslee of Alfred Centre, has been elected to the principalship of the Union School at Addison at a salary of \$1,400.

The State Convention of County Superintendents of the Poor will hold its 23d annual meeting at Bath, commencing on Tuesday, June 20, 1893, at 11 o'clock a. m., and continue its sessions three days.

The Wellsville papers say Prof. Harding, principal of the Wellsville Academy, is to leave that place because the Board of Education wouldn't increase his salary from \$1,250 to \$1,500. It is said he has an offer of \$1,800 elsewhere.

Mr. Wm. P. Cowles, father of the editor of the Democrat, suffered a slight stroke of paralysis, last week, that deprived him entirely of his eyesight. His age, 88 years, is not favorable to the recovery of his vision.—Wellsville Democrat.

It now looks as if Almond has natural gas. A well that was drilled many years ago, and plugged, has been cleaned out, and it is claimed it is a good gas producer. Arrangements are being made to lay pipes through the village and utilize the gas for fuel.

The milk suit against E. H. Hodnett of Hume, which was tried before Judge Daniels and appealed by the state milk testers, has been decided in Mr. Hodnett's favor. That will probably end a number of other suits brought against farmers in this section and elsewhere, who were accused of watering or skimming their milk.

The Mosaic glass company which is to move from Fostoria, Ohio, to Addison will take 24 families with it, besides 100 single men, it is said. The main building will be constructed of brick with a length of 410 feet and a width of 110 feet. There will be two furnaces, and employment will be given to 150 hands at the start, and later to 450, it is expected.

A press dispatch from Jamestown says: Deputy Collector Jones of this district says the amount of maple sugar made this season on which the Government will be asked to pay a bounty will be 20 times that produced last year. Allegany county, Mr. Jones says, will make the greatest production of any county in Western New York. The bounty paid last year in the district amounted to \$63,000, so if the production is 20 times as much this year the sugar makers of Western New York will have a neat little sum of Uncle Sam's money. Chautauqua county makes fine sugar, but not much of it.

Thousands of miles from home and among total strangers, a man with an untranslatable name was buried in Hornsellsville Friday night. He was one of a party accompanying animals to the World's Fair and when a few miles east of that place he was taken suddenly ill and died in a few minutes. It was reported that he had died with the cholera, and a number of physicians made an autopsy and said that death was caused by typhoid fever. His companions, among whom were two brothers, went on their way 15 minutes after the body had been removed from the car. They said that the dead man was a Jew, and from other indications it would seem that he was a native of a Russian province in Asia Minor.

Daily Mail Route to West Union.

On and after July 1st, 1893, the mail from Andover to Fulmer Valley, Independence and West Union will be carried daily instead of three times a week as at present. The change will be appreciated by all concerned, and will be a great accommodation to those getting their mail along this route.

Memorial Day.

Memorial Day will be observed in Andover under the auspices of Seaman Post 481, G. A. R. and auxiliary organizations, Lincoln Camp S. V. and the Woman's Relief corps. It is impossible at this date to obtain the full program, but it has been decided that there will be a speech at Prest's opera house after the graves of soldiers have been decorated. The annual memorial sermon will be preached by Rev. J. D. Bidden at the church of the Blessed Sacrament, the Sunday previous to Memorial Day, in the morning.

Visiting Maccabees.

Monday evening about thirty-five Maccabees from Whitesville visited the Andover Tent. The home members provided supper for the visitors at Swink's hotel, after which the members and visitors repaired to Masonic hall, where the Andover Maccabees hold their meetings, it being the evening of the regular semi-monthly meeting of the Andover Tent. Two candidates were initiated. After the session an informal supper was served, and the brethren spent some time in friendly social intercourse. As a popular organization the K. O. T. M. seems to be in it all over the country. Several Andover members recently visited the Whitesville Tent, and report that the organization in our sister village seems to be flourishing to a remarkable degree.

School Matters.

The Board of Education has released Miss Sophia McLaughlin from her contract to teach in Andover Union School the coming year. She received an offer of increased salary in Friendship, and requested the Andover Board to release her. In her stead our Board has secured Miss Mead, who taught the past year in Richburg, and who is very highly recommended. The members of the Andover Board are confronted with the pleasant (?) task of filling every place on the faculty with a new teacher this year, something which has not happened before in many years. They are using every effort to secure a first-class corps of teachers, and although under the circumstances an unusual amount of time must be spent, they are not neglecting the interests of the School.

Miss Lizzie Bassett, daughter of J. C. Bassett of this place, was last evening engaged as assistant preceptress for the coming year. Miss Bassett is a graduate of Alfred University.
