We suspect he is hiding under a cheese vat over in Clarksville, and won't peep until the storm has blown over.

In view of the nearness of the time for the U. S. Supreme Court to pass upon the constitutionality of the Geary anti-Chinese law, the Treasury officials having charge of the matter have decided to await the rendering of that decision before mapping out the policy of the Government in dealing with the Chinese now in this country who have failed to register as the law provides. If the constitutionality of the law is upheld, and most lawyers appear to be of the opinion that it will be, the officials of the Government will have to tackle the problem of getting rid of the unregistered Chinamen. The Geary law says that all unregistered Chinamen found in the United States after May 5, 1893, shall forthwith be returned to the country whence they came, and therein lies the problem. They are not disposed to go unless compelled, and they certainly will not pay their own fares, and Congress failed to make an appropriation to pay for their deportation. The arguments in the case will be heard by the Supreme Court to day, and it is hoped that a decision will be handed down within a week.

President Cleveland recently communicated to the Governor of Oregon, through Secretary of State Gresham, stating that rumors had reached the Presidential ear of contemplated violence to Chinamen in that State, and expressing the hope that the Governor would use every means in his power to preserve the peace. The Governor promptly telegraphed to Secretary Gresham as follows: "Let the President attend to his business; I will attend to mine!" There is quite a contrast between this message and the famous one from the Governor of North Carolina to the Governor of South Carolina. It reminds us of what a farmer once said to Rutherford B. Hayes when he was President. Mr. Hayes was in the country one day, and saw a farmer planting potatoes. He watched the process a few moments and then told the farmer that he was able to give him a few pointers in potato growing, following the remark with a dissertation on methods to be employed in planting and growing the tubers. The farmer listened attentively, and when the President had finished, he said: "I don't agree with your scientific talk. You keep on Presidentin' the United States, and I'll keep on plantin' taters, and I think we'll both be successful."

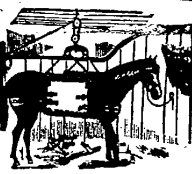
