The Dansville Electric Railway Co was incorporated last Thursday with a capital of \$50,000 for constructing an electric road three miles long in Dansville, Livingston county.

The seventy fourth anniversary of Odd Fellowship in America was celebrated in Hornellsville last Wednesday by the Steuben county and visiting lodges. The town was in gala attire, all of the business places and many residences being handsomely decorated. It is estimated that more than 1,500 Odd Fellows were in line.

A sad accident happened at the novelty works in Wellsville Thursday morning by which George Featherstone, a young man, lost his left arm and possibly his life. While at work about he machinery he caught his arm in a pulley and was jerked around the shafting several times before it could be stopped. The arm was crushed and mangled to the shoulder. Medical aid was summoned, but it was decided that the arm must be amputated. The arm was amputated Friday and the injured man is doing well.

In Judge Norton's court, J. Middaugh, who was arrested recently for cruelty to animals, appeared and asked to have the case taken before the grand jury, Messrs. Church & Church, of Wellsville, appearing for him. Motion was allowed and bail fixed at \$200. Mr. Middaugh is a veterinary surgeon and has dehorned over 2000 head of cattle the past winter, and his conviction would open the way for any amount of prosecution of the owners of the stock dehorned. It is proposed to raise a fund and fight the prosecution to the end.

The first well ever drilled in the Allegany field is still producing oil, and a sample bottle of the oil is on exhibition at the World's Fair. The well is located on the Redding farm, about a mile east of Richburg and is now owned by the Wirt Oil Co. The well came in on April 12, 1881, and caused great excitement among the natives. The first really big well struck was the Boyle well and located on the Moore farm, above Richburg. DEAD IN A CREEK.

Gilbert Murphy's Body Found In the Water This Afternoon.

Gilbert Murphy, a man somewhat under middle age, was found dead in sumed and the entire family, consistthe creek which runs past the depot, ing of Jackson, his wife, two sons and about 1 o'clock this afternoon. His body was first seen by Frank Martin, operator at the tower below the depot. pperator at the tower below the depot, lying face downward in the water within a few rods of the tower. Murphy was around this village yesterday, considerably intoxicated. He was at the depot about 7 o'clock last evening, and went from there to Main street. evening, but so far as we can learn was not seen this morning, and no one seems to know where he spent the night. It is not improbable that he fell in the water last night and lay there until found to-day. His fore-head was badly bruised and his upper lip was pressed inward, as if his face had lain upon a stone for some time. He was taken out of the water and removed to a sheltered place by undertaker Fowler. Coroner Barney of Belmont was summoned, but was too ill to come, and Coroner Bacon of Canaseraga was sent for. He will probably not arrive until train one this evening.

Murphy had been working for J. E. Redmon, who lives in the town of Greenwood. He had not been at Mr. Redmon's since Monday, but had been drinking more or less since that day. He has a brother and also a wife in Hornellsville,

Death of Father O'Laughlin.

Rev. Father O'Laughlin of Hornellsville died last Thursday. He was ap-pointed on the death of Father Early, Feb. 16, 1890, to succeed him as irremovable pastor of St. Anne's church Hornellsville. He was educated at Our Lady of Angels seminary at Sus-pension Bridge. He was for years an assistant to Moneignor Gleason at St. Bridget's, Buffalo.

The funeral was held Saturday. The attendance of priests and others was very large. The celebrant of the mass was Rev. Father Roche, of Middleport, a classmate of Father O'Laughlin, the two being ordained on the same day; the deacon was Rev. J. D. Biden of Andover; sub-deacon, Rev. F. Naughton, of Hammondsport; master of ceremonies, Rev. J. J. Sheehan, chancellor of the diocese of Buffalo. Rev. Gleason of Buffalo, vicar general of Buffalo preached the funeral sermon.

A. Well's barn. The windows and casings in the rear of Masonic block were broken and charred, also in Carpenter's, Rathbone's, Rauber's and Wells' stores, but the damage to the brick structures is light and fully covered by insurance. The best and most thorough work done by the firemen was on the Howell House barn. This structure stood within three or four feet of Scoville, Brown & Co's warehouses. The barn was destroyed but the adjoining buildings were hardly blackened. Every one concedes that it was one of the best fought fires in the history of Wells. themselves with glory "
