The Buffalo Express wants J. Sloat Fassett renominated for Governor of this State. That paper thinks he could be elected now. Many people in Allegany county are ready to second the motion.

Governor Flower has vetoed Assemblyman Congdon's bill providing that in counties where the support of the poor is made a county charge, the compensation of excise commissioners of towns shall be a county charge. He also vetoed Mr. Congdon's bill authorizing the State Board of Claims to hear the claim of Carter H. Morgan of Cuba.

Governor Flower has vetoed the bill allowing villages to use the Myers ballot machine in village elections. The Governor says he considered the bill unconstitutional, and states that he does not think any good lawyer would give it as his opinion that voting with this machine comes within the constitutional requirement of voting by ballot.

Mayor Charles F. Bishop, George Bleisteine, Herbert P. Bissell and John McManus, of Buffalo, visited Washington last week and had a conference with President Cleveland and Postmaster General Bissell respecting the patronage of Western New York. A slate was said to have been prepared which will be lived up to. Moreover, it doesn't contain the name of a "snapper." In view of present prospects, we propose the motto, "To the anti-snappers belong the spoils."

Assemblyman Congdon writes a letter to the Wellsville Reporter, explaining his action in voting for the famous "Buffalo Bill." He says it was because Sheehan and Endres helped him to pass certain local bills, and he felt obliged to help them when they asked him. The News has no desire to do injustice to Mr. Congdon or anybody else, and his reasons are about what we expected they would be. It is furthermore probably a fact that any member of the legislature must "give and take" favors if he gets any legislation through the mill. However, it is a bad indication for the prosperity of a people when the success of honest measures turns on the passage of others that are at least questionable.

The United States Supreme Court on Monday sustained the decision of the New York courts in favor of the constitutionality of the Chinese Exclusion Act. This Act provided that every Chinaman in the United States should register his name and place his photograph on file with a certain official. Those who failed to comply with these regulations were to be sent back to China. It is estimated that there are 110,000 Chinese in the United States. Reports from 34 districts show that 3,100 have registered. The 29 districts not yet heard from it is estimated will increase the number to 6,000, which is thought to be the maximum registration. During the present fiscal year 150 Chinese subjects have been deported. The cost of deportation from San Francisco is \$35 a head. Only \$16,806.03 of the appropriation for the enforcement of Chinese law remains unexpended. It is not known at the Treasury Department that any other fund can be drawn upon to provide for the expense of carrying out the requirements of the law. Intimations are heard that Congress may be convened to consider the matter.

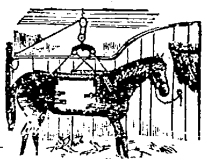
