



## VICINITY NEWS.

A Few Things That Have Happened Within One or Two Hundred Miles of Here.

The wife of Dr. Major, of Seio, died last Friday after a long illness.

About 1,600 quarts of milk are received daily at the Hornellsville milk station.

The Women's Relief Corps of Canisteo has been holding a fair to raise funds for a soldier's monument in Canisteo.

The third gas well is about to be drilled in Almond. It is expected the supply of gas will be sufficient for home consumption, and no more.

Miss Mary McCormick of Rexville, one of the lady passengers injured in the Lackawaxen wreck, March 16, left Port Jervis last week and is now in Hornellsville.

Fire destroyed the hotel barn in Seio last Sunday. Sparks from a locomotive caused the fire, and hard work was necessary to save the hotel. A quantity of hay was burned in the barn.

The Maccabees of Western New York and Pennsylvania are to hold a convention at Little Valley, June 8th. An ox roast is to be one of the leading features of the occasion.

Factory inspector Mulkin of Friendship visited Fillmore last week and found boys under 16 years of age employed in a cheese-box factory. The owners of the factory were arrested and fined \$25.

The Board of trustees of Wellsville has decided to purchase the Duke lot, opposite the First National bank, on which to erect the new city hall. Plans for the building will be prepared at once and the city building will soon be a reality.

Jerome Ellster, a resident of Pikeville, was wounded Saturday morning by the accidental discharge of his gun, while climbing over a fence. The load entered his stomach and the wound is thought to be fatal. Ellster is a married man, with several children.

The Erie block system from Jersey City to Chicago is now in operation and working finely. The Erie officials figure it will cost \$20,000 a year to operate this system, but say the expense will be small, for the new system makes accidents almost impossible.

George Hamilton, the alleged gas inspector of Jamestown, who, while pretending to be inspecting gas pipes in a private residence, committed an assault on an estimable woman in that city last August, was sentenced to 20 years in Auburn prison at hard labor. The penalty fits the crime.

News has been received in Wellsville to the effect that the Rev. H. N. Leddy was highly honored by the Pope while in Rome. His holiness made the Rev. Father one of his household, with the title of monsignor. The many friends of Father Leddy in Wellsville and vicinity are pleased and gratified at the honor so deservedly conferred upon him.

## AMENDMENTS TO SCHOOL LAW.

The Substance of Some of the Acts of 1893 In Which the People of this Vicinity are Interested.

J. F. Crocker, Superintendent of Public Instruction, has issued a circular giving the substance of the Acts of the Legislature of 1893 amending the School Laws. Commissioner Pollard sends the News one of these circulars, and we give below the portions thereof which are of interest to the people of this section.

Chapter 500 amends Consolidated School Act of 1864, as follows:

1. Power to Superintendent to withhold public money from district for wilfully disobeying order, decision, etc.

2. After current school year, school year shall be 160 days of school, inclusive of all legal holidays that may occur during the term of school and institute week, and exclusive of Saturdays, no Saturday to count as part of 160 days and no school shall be in session on a legal holiday.

3. Annual school meetings to be held on fourth Tuesday of August.

4. District school officers to be elected by ballot.

5. Upon all propositions arising at district meetings involving expenditure of money or levy of tax, the vote thereon must be by ballot or ascertained by taking and recording the ayes and noes.

6. Defines more fully conditions by which temporary or branch schools may be established in school districts.

7. Trustees to make reports to school commissioners this year, between July twenty-fifth and August first, dated July twenty-sixth; in each year thereafter to make such reports on August first; such reports to include the month of August of the preceding year.

8. Annual meetings of boards of education of every union free school district shall be held on the first Tuesday of September in each year.

9. In union free school districts other than those whose limits correspond with any city or incorporated village, special meetings to be called in the manner provided in section 10 of title 9 of the Consolidated School Act of 1864.

Chapter 485 amends section 15 of title 9 of Consolidated School Act of 1864, and provides that boards of education shall keep accurate record of all their proceedings in books to be provided, which books shall be open for public inspection. Said boards shall cause to be published once in each year and twenty days next before the annual meeting of district, in at least one public newspaper printed in said district, a full and detailed account of all moneys received for its use and of all moneys expended, giving the items of expenditure in full. Should no paper be published in the district, said boards shall publish such account, by notice to the taxpayers, by posting copies thereof, in five public places in the district. No member of such board shall be personally interested in any contracts made by board.

## Coroner's Inquest.

Dr. A. T. Bacon, of Canaseraga, came to Andover on train 29 last Thursday to investigate the death of Gilbert Murphy, who was found dead in the creek last Wednesday, as related in the News last week. The following jury was empaneled: Frank McGinty, Robert O'Donnell, W. H. Church, P. Delaney, Frank Prest, Neil Laverty, E. Kinney, L. L. Bullard, J. M. Beebe. Nothing new was elicited in the examination of witnesses, and the facts brought were substantially as related in this paper last week. The jury found that the deceased came to his death by drowning as a result of his own carelessness. The body was in charge of undertaker Fowler, who received instructions from the town officials.

## MEMORIAL DAY PROGRAM.

Official Notice from Seaman Post—Invitation To Other Societies and the Public.

Edward Seaman Post, 481, G. A. R., Andover, N. Y., May 22, 1893.

Memorial Day will be observed in the usual form by Seaman Post, and a cordial invitation is hereby extended to the Sons of Veterans, the Woman's Relief Corps, the schools, the clergy, and to the citizens in general to take part in the procession to the cemetery and the services to be held in the opera house.

The program will be as follows:

The members of Seaman Post, Lincoln Camp and the Woman's Relief Corps, will meet at Union Hall at 10 a. m. for the purpose of perfecting the arrangements for the day. The procession will form in front of Union Hall at 1:30 p. m. sharp, and preceded by the martial band, march to the cemetery, where the usual services will be held. The audience is requested to take part in the singing of the hymn "Nearer, My God to Thee," and also the national hymn, "America." After the decoration of the graves and the firing of the salute, the line of march will be taken up for the Opera House, where the Roll of Honor will be read and the oration delivered by the Rev. Mr. Stevens of Wallace, N. Y.

## Narrow Escape from Burning to Death.

Saturday's Wellsville Reporter says: "The residence and barn of E. H. Gallagher, Clark street, were destroyed by fire, with all their contents, at 3 a. m. this morning, and the family had a narrow escape from burning to death.

Gallagher, his wife and four young children were sleeping soundly in a room down stairs, and were awakened by a small dog belonging to them, jumping on the bed, licking their faces and barking. Gallagher aroused to find the house wrapped in flames and even the bed commencing to burn.

Quickly awaking the folks, he kicked the window out and threw the children out upon the ground, while the dog followed. Gallagher was burned about the head, and his wife was even worse burned, but nothing whatever was saved, as the house was completely airtight when the faithful dog awakened them. A sum of money in the bureau drawer could not even be secured.

An alarm of fire was sounded at just 3 o'clock, but the building was nearly consumed before the alarm was given and when the department arrived they could do no good, even with the hose from the two carts which were coupled together."
