Road Making.

At the present time there is no one subject that is attracting such universal attention as that of making good roads. Governors and legislators have discussed the matter, newspapers are full of it, and town and county officers are talking about it. Yet, after all, there are very few who know much about it. On every hand we hear the inquiry: "How much will it cost? What kind of material is necessary? Can the work be done by ordinary workmen, or will it be necessary to employ experts? What is the best machinery for the purpose, etc." If the various machines could be seen in operation one could estimate very closely how rapidly they would prepare material or put it in place. If an expert stood by to explain the various processes, tell the expense of material and its handling, then we should be able to find out just what every supervisor, highway commissioner and path master ought to know before he can proceed to make a good road. The great obstacle in the way of such practical experiments is the expense. The Inter State Fair management, seeing the great good that might be accomplished by such an exhibit, have resolved to make it one of the features of the coming fair, Aug. 28 to Sept. 9. Not content with this, but to make sure that those who will be the most benefitted by it, shall see this great exhibit, the management are securing the names of supervisors, town clerks, highway commissioners and path masters in all the adjoining counties to whom they propose to send complimentary tickets. They expect to invite ten thousand men interested in road building to come and see this exhibit free.

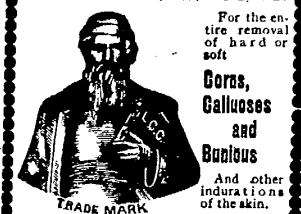
