The running expenses of the World's Fair are \$45,000 a day. The receipts thus far have averaged \$10,000.

Dr. George H. Witter, supervisor of the town of Wellsville, is mentioned as a candidate for the office of State Senator from this district. William Weaver, ex-superintendent of the poor, is announced as a candidate for Member of Assembly.

The Sheriff of St. Louis county, Mo., is in jail for 10 days for contempt of court. He locked himself up. He'll get a fee for that. He will also get good pay for his own board during his stay in the prison. The Sheriff seems to have all the best of it.

The Amalgamated Association of Iron and Steel Workers is about to begin its annual task of revising the wage scale. There is likely to be no such trouble as followed the adoption of the scale last year. The Amalgamated Association has learned something in the meantime.

A western genius who has learned how to get free lunches thus computes the expense of a day at the Chicago Fair grounds: Street car fare, 10 cents; admission 50 cents; milk at milk exhibit, free; fresh rolls at yeast exhibit, free; buttered crackers at butter exhibit, free; total 60 cents. This is the ingenuity of economy.

A State court in Chicago has granted a temporary injunction restraining the World's Fair authorities from closing the exposition on Sunday. Now if the Federal court at Chicago shall grant the injunction for which it has been petitioned restraining the Fair from opening on Sunday, the managers of the show will be in the position of the boy whose father will whip him if he does and whose mother will whip him if he doesn't.

The handsomest monument at Gettysburg will be unveiled July 3. It stands in the National Cemetery within a stone's throw of the beautiful statue of Major General John F. Reynolds. It was erected by the state of New York in memory of the 1,300 valiant sons who are clustered in soldiers' graves at its foot. Its total height is 92 feet 9 inches, its weight is many tons and its cost is \$62,000. It is within the bounds of reason to say that the New York state monuments surpass in artistic design, beauty of execution, and solidity of construction those erected by any other state in the Union. On the battle-scarred fields the Empire State has buried with its fallen heroes \$266,000 in monumental testimonials. The climax of its work, however, will be reached on July 3d, the thirtieth anniversary of the close of the battle, when the great state monument will be unveiled with appropriate ceremonies.
