The Woman's Christian Temperance Union of Andover meets the first and third Thursday in each month.

The statement that suddenly enforced abstinence kills, is not borne out by facts. The death rate in prisons is only eight in every thousand, a much lower rate than in towns.

The legislature of Quebec has passed a law prohibiting the sale of tobacco to boys under 18 years of age. Boys under 15 will be imprisoned or fined when found using the weed. How about the fathers who set the fifteen-year-old boys the example?

A bill extending full municipal suffrage to women has passed the Michigan House of Representatives, 57 to 25, and the Senate 18 to 11, and has been signed by the Governor, thus becoming a law. This is the greatest victory the woman suffrage movement has won since Wyoming was admitted to the Union as a State.

If any belated person doubts the ability of women to take their share in the government, he should have attended the Congresses of the Columbian Fair, held May 15 to 21. There, from many countries, came a host of wise and noble women, interested in a great variety of important subjects, which were presented and then discussed in a manner worthy of the subjects and worthy of the occasion. The Chicago newspapers, with great fairness, gave the world the titles of the topics discussed, and in some cases gave the speeches in full. Their large audience of readers should have had the last shred of contempt for the intellect of women rooted out from their minds.

Alfred University Commencement.

As usual, great preparations are being made for commencement at Alfred University, which will occur June 18-22, 1893. Following is an outline program of the exercises: Sunday evening, annual sermon before the Christian associations, the Rev. Boothe C. Davis, Alfred Centre; Monday evening, Alleghenian and Alfredian session; Tuesday morning, Athenaeum session; Tuesday evening, annual concert; Wednesday morning, Alumni session; Wednesday afternoon, Alumni session; Wednesday evening, Alumni banquet; Thursday morning, commencement exercises; Thursday afternoon, Field day; Thursday evening, class exercises. On Wednesday Judge N. E. Hubbard, of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, will deliver a memorial address upon President Allen, also the inaugural ceremonies of Dr. A. E. Main, as president, will occur on this day. Prof. LaFroze Meriman is to give the annual concert. The Crandall Hooks have kindly consented to open their parlors during the week to be used as a waiting and reading room for visitors. Erie Train Three Wrecked.

Erie train No. 3 was thrown from the track at Jamestown last Thursday. The engine and baggage and two express cars were demolished. None of the passengers were injured. Fireman Smith of Greenville, was scalded and Engineer Williams and Expressman Bousier, both of Salamanca, were slightly hurt. The accident occurred at a crossing, and was caused by a stone being wedged between the rail and the plank which are laid between the rails.

Death of Senator Walker.

Charles Edward Walker, state senator from this district, died at his home in Corning Thursday morning of spinal meningitis. He was the son of the late C. C. B. Walker, one of the best known men in this section in his day. He was born in 1860, being consequently 33 years of age. Charles E. Walker was elected to the state senate two years ago by a combination of circumstances too well known to need repetition, and his course as a legislator has been marked by a degree of ability and independence that was a surprise to many people.

The funeral was held Friday afternoon and was attended by many prominent men from different sections of the State. The burial occurred at Palmyra. Mr. Walker was unmarried.
