The action of William R. Laidlaw against Russell Sage for \$50,000 damages for being used, as Laidlaw alleges, for a shield when Norcross threw the bag of dynamite in Mr. Sage's office, was ended Tuesday, the judge dismissing the case on the ground that the injuries that Laidlaw suffered were not the result of being used as a shield by Mr. Sage, but would have been received anyway.

It is too soon to say whether the change is good or bad; its workings under the new regime will speak for themselves in a few months. Then will be the proper time to blame or to praise.

Edwin Booth, the great actor, died at the Players' Club in New York last Wednesday morning about 1 o'clock. He was 59 years old. Mr. Booth had been in failing health for several years, and for several weeks preceding his death had been very low. Mr. Booth was one of the greatest Shakespearian actors this country has ever produced, and in the character of "Hamlet" he has probably never had a superior, and very few equals, in the world. He was a brother of the notorious John Wilkes Booth, whose assassination of President Lincoln cast a great cloud over Edwin Booth's life.

Comptroller of Currency Eckels is getting more notoriety than most of the members of the Cabinet. Every day or two he springs a new sensation on the public. His latest is that stockholders in National banks that fail will be at once, as soon as the estimate can be made up, assessed on their stock for the amount necessary to make good the losses of the bank, that is up to the 100 per cent. which the law makes them liable for. Heretofore the custom has been not to make these assessments until all the other assets had been realized on, and it has often been the case that stockholders had so disposed of their property that the assessment could not be collected.

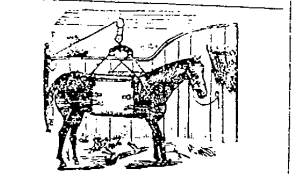
