The Wellsville Democrat says: "The family of Charles Rice, at Wolf Spring, near Allentown, is plunged into deepest grief over a tragedy which occurred there Saturday afternoon. The particulars of the sad case are meagre, but tend to show conclusively that children should not be allowed to play with fire arms.

Saturday afternoon the two children of Mr. Rice, a boy of twelve years and a girl of ten, were playing in the house. The boy had a revolver, two chambers of which were loaded. It is said he was placing heads of parlor matches on the empty chambers and snapping the weapon at his sister, when one of the loaded chambers exploded and the bullet entered her left breast, lodging in the shoulder. It is also reported that the children quarreled, and that the boy deliberately shot his sister in a fit of passion. We have been unable to verify either of the statements. The little one may recover. The boy has not yet been arrested.
