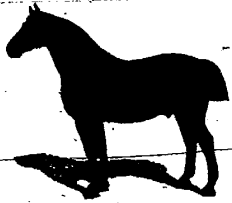

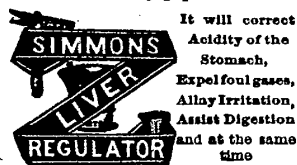

Several impromptu speeches were made, among those called on being Prof. A. D. Howe of Whitesville and Attorney Crayton L. Earley of this place.

The speeches must have been heard to be appreciated. They were "chuck full" of sense, nonsense and everything else that goes to make up suitable after-dinner speeches. Each speaker hit the mark exactly where he or she aimed.

The Euterpe Club's singing received perhaps the greatest applause, and they merited it all. Their music was superb.

During the time the supper was being served Cannon's orchestra rendered a program of delightfully sweet music. Andover is proud of this organization and its members have reason for self-congratulation upon the success of their efforts.

Principal Armstrong's Report.

The annual report of Principal Armstrong to the Board of Education is as follows:

To the Board of Education of the Andover Union School:

The school year of '92 and '93 closes with every evidence of prosperity. True it is that we have been hindered in many ways from realizing our anticipations for the year; yet so prosperous has the work been that I am sure the members of the Board may feel justly proud of their school.

At the opening of the school year we were greeted with such a large number of non-resident pupils as to make us feel a just pride in making this the most prosperous year in the history of the school. As the year advanced the number constantly increased until at the middle of the second quarter 43 non-resident pupils were registered, and at the same time a full enumeration of all pupils then in school showed the number to be 243; and the school was manifesting an interest unprecedented during my term of service. At this time the "scarlet fever scare" started, which completely demoralized the school, sent our non-residents home and decreased our daily attendance about one-half. The A Primary was the department most affected. In this room for several days the attendance did not exceed a half-dozen. The seventh grade was also demoralized to such an extent as to require a large amount of the work to be reviewed another year. The Academic department was least affected and the loss here was principally in non-residents who were either frightened away or required to go home because of exposure. Nevertheless our school has made an unprecedented record in sustaining non-resident patronage, having an average of 29.212 during the year. The amount collected for tuition is \$399.85, exceeding last year's tuition money by about \$49.

THE REGENTS.

During the year this school has earned 19 preliminary certificates, 13 junior certificates, 13 thirty-count certificates.

The display of wedding presents was beautiful to behold, and the elegance and value of each separate article is worthy of special mention. Each piece denoted not only the good taste of the donor, but was a sure indication of the esteem in which the recipient was held by her friends and associates.

The newly-married pair took the evening train for Chicago, where they will make a brief stop, going thence to their future home.

Miss Pardon is so well and favorably known to the people of Andover that no words of ours can tell the people more of her good qualities than they already know. It is, however, a pleasure to us to state that the esteem in which she is held could not by any possibility be greater. Those who know her best are her warmest friends, and friendship for such as she is the kind that lives and grows in the hearts of her admirers. No measure of happiness or prosperity that can come to her will be unmerited, and if good words and wishes count for anything her cup of joy will be full.

Mr. Haughton is known to be worthy of the prize he has secured. He is a prominent business man in Sioux Falls, and the outlook for the future of the worthy couple is indeed promising.
