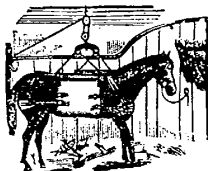

VICINITY NEWS.

A Few Things That Have Happened Within One of Two Hundred Miles of Here.

The paid fire department at Salamanca has been disbanded and a volunteer organization perfected.

George Burdick of Almond has given the Presbyterian church of that place a pipe organ costing \$1000.

The thirty-third annual fair of the New York State Agricultural society will be held at Syracuse Sept. 14 to 21.

During the revival meeting that have been held at Alfred Station recently, over eighty persons were united with the Seventh Day Baptist church of that village.

John Mantle, a farmer living near Addison, Steuben Co., was struck by lightning Wednesday morning, and the clothing was burned entirely off him. It is thought he will recover.

A young man named McLaughlin was accidentally killed at Olean on the Fourth of July by train 29 on the Erie road. He was an orphan and belonged to the track gang. He lived at Friendship.

Ward's bank, a private concern at Forestville, Chautauqua county, has busted. Ward, himself, was found dead at his home Monday morning, a case of suicide. The deposits of the bank were from \$50,000 to \$75,000.

The large cement factory at Wayland, N. Y., was nearly destroyed by fire Tuesday evening. The loss is estimated at \$75,000. The factory is owned by Thos. McMillen & Son of Syracuse, and was built in 1892 at a cost of \$150,000.

Two years ago an idiot boy was put under the charge of Dr. Roswell Parke of Buffalo. Dr. Parke sawed a big "Y" in his cranium and wedged the skull open, thus enlarging it. The brain expanded and the boy is now of sound mind and perfectly healthy.

The Board of Education of Wellsville has engaged Prof. L. W. Craig, A. M., as Principal of the academy. Prof. Craig is a graduate of Wesleyan University, class of 1879. He has had 12 years' experience as a teacher, a part of the time in the seminaries at Tilton, N. S., and Pennington, N. H.

A trolley car ran over a baby at Buffalo, Tuesday, crushing it into mince meat. A crowd of 6,000 people surrounded the car and the lynching of the motorman was only prevented by the police. "Kill the wretch," "Tear him to pieces" were the shouts made by the excited spectators. The motorman had locked himself in the car and begged for mercy.

We hadn't heard about it before, but an exchange says: A gang of sneak thieves has for some time been robbing Erie freight trains on the western division. Not long since a box containing thread disappeared from one of the cars near Friendship station, and it was found rifled in Maple Grove cemetery. A short time afterward thread was peddled about the county at cheap prices.

The house of Mr. Jones, the Deputy Collector of Internal Revenue at Jamestown, was broken open by burglars early Monday morning. Mr. Jones had a large sum of Government money in his possession, and the burglar probably knew this. He was frightened away however, by the Collector, who was aroused and fired a revolver at him, but without effect.

Eben M. Bennett of the town of Rushford committed suicide Thursday afternoon by hanging himself in his barn. He had been in ill health for some time and had fits of melancholia. He had for many years held various town offices, being supervisor several times. He was a farmer and a man of recognized experience and judgment in the cheese industry. He was aged 45 years and leaves a wife and two children.

Very few persons think of the extent of the grape culture in the state of New York. Gov. Flower, who has paid considerable attention to the subject says that 40,000 acres of New York land are devoted to grapes and the value of the product is \$122 per acre. We lead every state in the Union except California, in the production of

grapes, and the average market value of our crop in 1890 was four times as much per ton as that of California's yield.

Passengers on the Buffalo & Geneva accommodation of the Central had an exciting experience near Shortsville on the Auburn road on the 3d instant. The train was running at a good rate of speed when suddenly an immense ball of fire dropped from the sky to the track directly in front of the train and exploded, making a terrific noise. The engineer and fireman were frightened almost out of their wits and all of the people in the train jumped out of their seats except the conductor, who was unable to move, the entire left side of his body being paralyzed for the time being. He was the only person on the train affected. By the time he reached Batavia he had almost entirely recovered. It was raining very little at the time the phenomenon occurred and there was no thunder or flashes of lightning. The train was not struck, but the ties in front of it were torn up and the engine covered with splinters.

Now For Water Works.

The Village Board of Trustees are spending considerable time investigating the question of water works. Thus far the prospects appear good for putting in a plant at a reasonable cost. Mr. A. M. Burrows visited the village of Avoca, Steuben Co., during the past week. That village is about the size of Andover, and a system of water works was recently put in by the corporation. The investment has proved more than satisfactory to the people of that place, and the operation of the system is entirely satisfactory, giving the people ample fire protection and also water for domestic purposes, which is used by a large majority of the families in the village.

Mr. George L. Tubbs, the present postmaster of Hornellsville, who has had large experience in the construction of water plants, was in town yesterday and in company with President Cannon and Trustees Clark, Owen and Burrows, visited some of the sources of supply which exist in the vicinity of this place. There seems to be no doubt whatever that an abundant supply of pure spring water can be secured, and the preliminary work will be begun at once. The News will keep its readers posted in regard to the progress of the work.

The Board of Trustees met last evening and organized as a Board of Water Commissioners. They will endeavor to secure the services of an engineer at once and prepare plans and specifications for the construction of the water works plant.

A Voice From Cuba.

The enterprising and flourishing village of Andover held its second election to vote on a system of water works last Thursday and the proposition was carried by four majority. This is the usual result in all progressive villages where this question is submitted to the taxpayers, and it is also usual that a favorable majority is not received till the second election. The citizens of Andover are to be congratulated, and we are confident they will never regret the adoption of a water system owned by the village, for time will convince those who are now opposed that it is the greatest improvement and blessing to be inaugurated in any place. From \$15,000 to \$18,000 will be expended in constructing the works.—Cuba Patriot.
