The question whether a tomato is a fruit or vegetable has finally been decided by the Supreme Court of the United States. Several years ago some imported tomatoes came through the custom house in New York city, when the collector classified them as vegetables and collected duty accordingly. The importers disputed this point, and claimed tomatoes to be fruit and entitled to come in free. The matter was taken into court, which decided in favor of the collector's claim that the tomato is a vegetable.

According to chapter 344 of the laws of 1893, the following changes are made in the tenure of certain town officers: Hereafter in all the counties of the state, except Kings, supervisors and town clerks will be elected for two years. The electors of each town may, at their annual town meetings, determine by resolution whether there shall be elected in their town one or three commissioners of highways. If three shall be determined upon, three commissioners of highways shall be elected for the terms of one, two and three years respectively, and one commissioner only shall thereafter annually be elected, who shall hold his office for three years.

Reappearance of cholera in Europe does not cause any alarm among United States Treasury officials. Reports are daily received from United States Consuls and other agents abroad, and they concur that the climatic conditions that have so far obtained in Europe are not conducive to the spread of cholera there. There have been sporadic cases of cholera and some deaths from it, but the disease has not spread as it did last year, and they expect that it will not reach this country. Assistant Secretary Curtis, of the Treasury Department, who has general supervision over the Marine Hospital service of the Treasury, coincides with this view of the situation as expressed by foreign agents, but still maintains and will continue to do so, the closest scrutiny over immigrants and others coming from cholera infected countries. The system of inspection on both sides of the Atlantic is believed to be as nearly complete as can be made.

A St. Paul man who has lost both arms has been encouraged by some surgeons to believe that he can have new arms grafted upon the stumps if he can find anybody who will submit to giving up his arms for a consideration. His hope is to buy an arm of some person who has been condemned to die. The success of former bone grafting experiments has probably given confidence in this remarkable undertaking. It would be more reasonable to graft a new arm upon an armless man than to graft a piece of a dog's bone into a boy's short leg, as was done in New York a few years ago. But the St. Paul man is not likely to find anyone who will sell him an arm. Even if some condemned murderer should be willing to make the experiment, he probably would not be permitted to do so, as the operation might cost him his life and thus cheat the law. Suppose, however, that the St. Paul man finally induces some condemned man to part with his arms, and the same are successfully grafted onto his own body. What a fortune he could make by going about the country exhibiting "the hand that held the knife that killed John Smith," or "the arm that struck the fatal blow to pretty Susie Jones." The possibilities of the case are almost beyond imagination.

Mrs. E. Brewster is visiting in Hornellsville at present.

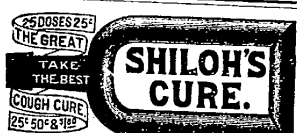
