

## SUNDAY OPENING AGAIN

The Directors' Action Does Not Settle the Question.

### CLINGMAN'S INJUNCTION IN FORCE

His Lawyer Says That the Gates Will Not be Closed Next Sunday Unless His Client Backs Down—Yesterday's Receipts to be Given to the Fund for the Killed Firemen.

CHICAGO, July 17.—By an almost unanimous vote a large majority of the World's Fair Directors decided last Friday that hereafter the gates of the Exposition shall be closed to the public Sunday. But this action, it appears, does not finally settle the question. A temporary injunction obtained several weeks ago by Charles W. Clingman, one of the stockholders in the Exposition company and a tax payer of Chicago, compelling the gates to be kept open, still stands in the way.

Judge Stein, of the Superior Court of Cook county, who granted the decree, said this morning:

"The injunction is still in force; their is no doubt about that. If the court's attention is officially called to any violation of the order it will, after due consideration, take such action as may appear proper."

Further than this the judge declined to discuss the matter. He said that it would not be becoming in him to anticipate what might be done.

William F. Mason, solicitor for the petitioner, said:

"The gates will not be closed next Sunday unless my client desires to back down."

The entire receipts of yesterday—over \$65,000—will be given to the fund for the firemen who lost their lives in the cold storage warehouse disaster.

Special attractions had been worked out with reference to the day. All the Exposition bands rendered special music, and in the evening the Iowa State band, which contributed its services, appeared on the plaza in front of the Administration building.

There were also other attractions on the main grounds, including full illumination in the evening.

All the exhibit buildings and most of the State headquarters were open from morning until night, and every one on the grounds in an official capacity worked for the success of the day.

The Midway had a new interest to Sunday visitors, owing to the fact that all or part of the receipts at many of the concessions were also devoted to the relief fund.

The receiver who has been placed in charge of the boats which were under the control of the Columbian Launching Co., has been ordered by Judge Collins to tie up the crafts and notify their owners. The boats were leased by the company to ply between the city and Jackson Park during the World's Fair.

Work is being pushed rapidly again this morning on the ruins of the fire by nearly 300 laborers and teamsters. No more bodies have been found although much of the debris of timber and iron has been removed from around the smokestack and boilers.

The belief is growing now that no more human remains will be unearthed. The ice making machines and engines are being taken out with derricks, but two weeks work is before the men yet.

### PURGING THE ROLLS.

Nearly 12,000 Pension Cases Examined by the Board of Revision.

Five Hundred Supposed Recipients of Pensions Found to be Dead—The Suspensions Average Twenty-five a Day.

WASHINGTON, July 17.—The Board of Revision, appointed by Commissioner of Pensions Lochren to examine the pension cases which have come before the bureau since the Disability Pension act went into effect with a view to ascertaining whether fraud has been practiced, has already examined nearly 12,000 claims. About 10,000 of these cases have been sent to the Medical Division for further examination.

Nearly 500 supposed recipients of pensions have been found to be dead.

In the new board little attention is paid to strict technicalities that may unjustly take away a pensioner's claim, but all cases are considered with a view of the worthiness of the individual to receive the pension. If two reviewers concur in the opinion of total disability in a case, the latter is not sent to the Medical Division; instead of this action, which is usually taken, the name of the pensioner is permitted to remain undisturbed on the rolls.

Only ten or twelve cases of rebutting evidence permitted to be filed in the 60 days period accorded pensioners to bring such evidence have yet been received. The number, however, will increase daily hereafter, and within a week or a fortnight it is believed that a large amount of this additional evidence will be received.

The purging of the rolls is creating a large amount of extra labor for the clerks in the agency in this city. The number of suspensions now average 25 a day, but involve many details that require time as well as labor. The proportion of those who reside in the city or the district, however, is small. This is due to the wide scope of the jurisdiction of the agency.

### SHE POURED IN KEROSENE.
