THE CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION.

The constitution of this State provides that every twentieth year after 1866, and at such time as the legislature may provide, the people shall vote upon the question, "Shall there be a convention to revise the constitution and amend the same?" In case a majority of the electors voting shall decide in favor of a convention for such purpose, the legislature shall provide for the election of delegates to such convention.

This question was submitted to the people in 1886 and was answered in the affirmative by a large majority, but the legislature, owing to conflict of parties, delayed calling the convention until 1893, when the present act for that purpose was finally passed.

At the election to be held next November, 175 delegates are to be elected to such convention. Of these, 160 are to be elected by senate districts, five from each senate district, and fifteen delegates are to be elected for the state-at-large. Every elector may vote for the five district delegates and the fifteen delegates at large, and the delegates receiving the highest number of votes shall be elected; so that there will be no minority representation. The general laws providing for the nominations and elections of state officers apply to the election of these delegates.

Any male or female citizen of the age of 21 years is eligible. The convention will meet in the capital at Albany, on the second Tuesday of May, 1894, and organize by electing a president and a secretary, who shall appoint three assistants. A librarian, one assistant, eight keepers and fifteen messengers, a sergeant-at-arms and an assistant are to be appointed.

The work of this convention will be very important. The Judiciary article of the constitution—particularly that part relating to the over-worked Court of Appeals—will receive much attention. The question of increasing the membership of the legislature; of limiting its power to pass local acts; of electing many officers now appointed, such as the superintendent of public works, superintendent of prisons, railroad commissioners, members of the state board of arbitration, and of the commission of claims, will be brought to the attention of the convention and pressed by the friends of popular government.

The political parties and the various organizations interested in public affairs are, at this early day, talking of the great importance of this convention, and are discussing the probable outcome of the election. It is said that the labor organizations will take more than ordinary interest in the election of delegates, and that they will demand from the two dominant parties representation on their tickets. The advocates of woman suffrage will also try to secure the adoption of a clause giving the women of this state the right to vote at all elections.
