ALLEGANY'S RIGHTS SECURED

(From the Wellsville Reporter.)

Grand Old Allegany has at last been accorded her rights in the matter of equal representation with Cattaraugus and Chautauqua counties in the coming Senatorial convention and it is largely through the efforts of state committeeman W. J. Glenn that this result has been accomplished. Under the circumstances surrounding the case it is reasonably certain that the basis agreed upon by the Senatorial Committee at Jamestown on Saturday will not be disturbed by the coming convention.

This matter of representation has been a bone of contention between the three counties from the time the 34th Congressional District was created in 1884, for at that time the Republican leaders of Allegany county allowed the precedent to be established of conceding increased representation to both of the other counties.

When Allegany became a part of the 32d Senatorial District, therefore, the task of securing an equal voice in the deliberations of the party was seriously handicapped by precedent. Mr. Glenn, however, aided by representative Republicans, set about the task, and he has succeeded. At the meeting of the Senatorial committee in March Mr. Glenn, Allegany's member of that committee, taking advantage of the dissatisfaction which existed in Cattaraugus county over the old senatorial apportionment, and certain abuses which had crept into the organization, succeeded in getting a majority vote in favor of his plan of fifteen delegates from each of the three counties. This of course, found little favor in Chautauqua and Cattaraugus counties, where the practice of holding popular conventions has long prevailed, but owing to the loyalty of the Chautauqua county boys to the action of the committee a considerable sentiment had been developed in favor of holding one convention under that rule.

At the meeting of the committee on Saturday it was evident that it was policy for Allegany to concede the larger representation, and Mr. Glenn, in the interest of party harmony and good feeling consented to the change to 15 delegates instead of 15, while at the same time insisting that the representation must remain equal.

This justice to Allegany is only right.
