Pension Commissioner Lockren has extended until October 10, 1893, the period within which pensioners whose pensions have been suspended may make proof of their right to receive them.

The Republican County Convention will be held at Friendship on Tuesday, Aug. 29, at one o'clock p. m. Andover will be entitled to four delegates, an increase of one over former years.

Witter not only stands the best chance of securing the endorsement of the people of his own town, but is also the better qualified to represent the people in the Legislature. However this may be, the opinion is freely expressed that the proper place to fight this battle is in Wellsville. It would seem that the Republicans of that place are better able to judge of the merits of the two men than are the people of other towns, and if Allegany is to stand any show in the Senatorial fight she should be practically solid for one candidate.
