Organization of Bankers.

Representatives from many of the
banks in this county met at Belmont
last Saturday and organized the Alle-
gany County Bankers' Association.
The following officers were elected:
President, Hon. W. F. Jones, of Wells-
ville; Secretary, W. J. Richardson, of
Belmont; Treasurer, J. M. Davis, of
Belmont. Executive committee—H.
C. Morgan of Cuba, A. Miner Well-
man of Friendship, J. H. Rutherford
of Angelica.

The following resolutions were
unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS, In the present financial
condition of the country as shown by
the extreme scarcity of currency every-
where prevalent, the city banks are un-
able to provide their country corres-
pondents with sufficient currency for
the transaction of their regular busi-
ness, and

WHEREAS, The country banks are
thereby compelled to take action for
the protection of themselves and their
depositors; now be it

Resolved, That the banks of Allegany
County are justified in declining to cash
New York drafts, or checks drawn
upon banks in other towns.

Resolved, That until further notice
depositors be requested to make all
checks payable in New York Exchange.

Resolved, That as an expression of
confidence in each other, the banks of
the county hereby extend to each other
assurances of assistance should oc-
casion require.

Resolved, That a copy of these resolu-
tions be published in the county news-
papers, and also posted conspicuously
in each of the several banks of the
county.

Checks as Circulating Medium.

At the present time there is a great
scarcity of currency in all forms, (viz.
paper money, gold and silver.) There
is none to be had from New York, and
that city is the source from which we
receive our currency. This condition

of affairs may not continue long, but
no one can tell how long it may last.
Now is the time for all who are inter-
ested to become as well acquainted
with the situation as possible. One
main object for which we need curren-
cy in this section is for payment for
the many products offered for sale by
the farmers. The buyers who are
buying this produce cannot get the
currency from the parties to whom
they sell, but are obliged to accept
payment by checks and in turn the
buyers must give their checks to the
farmers or stop buying produce.

Under the present condition of things
these checks will have to be used as a
circulating medium among the farmers,
merchants and other parties until the
currency becomes more plentiful. If the
holders of these checks should prefer,
they could doubtless be exchanged for
New York drafts at the banks upon
which they are drawn, but this would
probably not be necessary. Individual
checks from parties who are known to
be good will be honored by all business
men, and accepted in lieu of cash.

UTICA, Aug. 14.—Market steady.
Sales: Five hundred and eighty boxes
at 8½c, 553 boxes at 8½c, 1240 boxes at

828 boxes on commission. Butter-

Friday evening at Seio a bolt of
lightning descended out of an appar-
ently cloudless sky, followed immedi-
ately by a heavy clap of thunder,
striking R. McQueens house. It divid-
ed, going three different directions, one
descending into the cellar. The house
is badly shattered, plastering torn off in
nearly every room. No one was injured,
but the occupants of the house were
considerably shocked.

Reports of the grasshopper plague
come from every direction. The
grasshoppers are eating corn, cleaning
the cobs of kernels, and are ruining
the oats in many parts of the country.
One farmer near Batavia, it is related,
was cutting oats, when the roller which
runs the apron became so clogged with
the insects that he was obliged to re-
move them before proceeding. The
damage done near Dunkirk by the
grasshoppers is great. Grapevines
along the whole lake shore are being
stripped of their foliage and the fruit,
exposed to the rays of the sun, much
of it withers and drops off. In many
places the corn is all eaten away and
vegetation in general is much injured.
