At a meeting of the Allegany County Publishing Association, held at Bolivar, April 23, 1892, the following rules were unanimously adopted to take effect the week beginning May 2, 1892.

Rule 1.—That not less than 5 cents per line be charged for resolutions of respect, and local notices of entertainments from which revenue is to be derived.

Rule 2.—Cards of thanks to be charged \$1.

Rule 3.—Obituary notices, except such as are published as a matter of news, and lists of wedding presents to be charged for at not less than 5 cents per line.

The People's Party met in session at Belmont last week and elected Rufus Harwood for member, Miss Lizzie Williams for secretary, M. Whiting for treasurer, and W. B. Babbitt for clerk.

Mr. Clark Boyd, who has been seriously ill for several weeks, is improving at present.

The Annual Harvest Festival of the Presbyterian church will be held Sept. 13. Get ready for a good time and watch for further announcements.

A number of Andover "boys" went to Wellsville last Friday to see the ball game between Wellsville and Hornellsville. The latter team won by a score of 8 to 6.

We understand a large number of people from this place are preparing to depart for the World's Fair on Sept. 2d, on which day there will be an excursion at low rates.

Angelica's new barrel factory will soon begin active business with a force of 25 hands. The machinery is of the latest make and they expect to be able to turn out 4,000 heads per day.

Thos. Tefft, Deputy County Clerk, has been in poor health for some time, and has been in the sanitarium at Hornellsville receiving treatment. He has returned home very much improved.

At the Republican caucus held in Whitesville (Independence) last Saturday evening, Theodore Cobb and A. L. Chase were elected delegates to the Senatorial convention, and Amos Reynolds, Dr. M. B. Titus and Oscar Potter were elected delegates to the County convention.

There will be no service at the Presbyterian church next Sunday, owing to the fact that the pastor, Rev. G. M. Jones, who recently met with an accident, has not sufficiently recovered to enable him to hold services. Everybody hopes to see him around again soon.

At the school meeting last evening A. M. Burrows was elected chairman and G. M. Barney, secretary of the Board of Education, acted as secretary. E. J. Arwood was elected member of the Board of Education to succeed himself, and John E. Cannon was elected to succeed T. McTigue.

About eighty Seventh Day Baptists from Plainfield, N. J., went west on train 3 Monday. They were joined by forty more at Alfred, and a number at this station, and together they journeyed to Milton, Wis., where a convention of that denomination is to be held. After the convention is adjourned the delegates will visit the World's Fair.

Attorney Charles A. Dolson of Hornellsville has received a communication from Comptroller Frank Campbell advising him of his appointment as a commissioner to examine books, records and papers in the surrogate's office of Sullivan county, this state, in relation to collateral inheritance tax. The examination will consume about forty days.

The drouth is evidently more severe in the eastern part of the state than it is in this section. Reports from Ulster, Orange, Sullivan, Delaware and Greene counties show that streams are drying up and growing crops are suffering for moisture. Wells that were never known to fail in giving a bountiful supply are now useless. The owners of private ponds and streams are selling water by the barrel at prices ranging from 25 to 75 cents.
