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ANDOVER WATER WORKS

of Rids Received-A Few Notes

The work of constructing the Andover water works will probably begin within the next two weeks. The Water Commissioners have awarded the contract for the pipe to the Lake Shore Foundry of Cleveland, which has agreed to ship the pipe at once and give the village one year's time in which to pay for the same. They will accept payment, however, at any time within the year. The engineer and contractor are expected here tomorrow to make final estimate on size and quantity of pipe, etc., and the foundry has stated that the pipe can be shipped

the work and the Ludlow Valve Co. for the hydrants being considered by the Board the most favorable the contracts were awarded to them for all except the pipe. It will require nearly 300 tons of water pipe and 30 hydrants for Andover water works.

The reservoir will be 160 feet abov main street and will contain 160,000 gallons of water. The reservoir alone will supply two fire streams six hours. A 4-inch pipe from the springs will discharge into the reservoir 180,000 gallons of water per day. A 6-inch pipe will discharge 475,000 gallons per day. The springs are 306 feet above main street and two miles distant.

With the reservoir pressure there will be a discharge through one fire hose of 225 gallons of water per minute to a height of 100 feet and a horizontal distance of 130 feet.
