Judge Hamilton Ward has decided an excise case corresponding with the Owego case and others in which the right of anti-license excise com- missioners to refuse to grant license has been questioned. Judge Ward's decision agrees with that of Judge Forbes in the Owego case. The case in question came before Judge Ward on a writ of certiorari obtained by Charles T. Watkins proprietor of the Watkins House, Warsaw, to re- view the action of the excise com- missioners of that town who denied him a license on the ground that a majority of them had been elected as no-license commissioners and hence were obligated to the people to refuse to grant licenses. Judge Ward gives a careful, clear history of excise legislation in the state down to the present time, and after an elaborate review reaches the con- clusion that the Legislature by the local-option clause of 1892 meant to recognize the system of local option or prohibition which was in existence in the state at the time of the pas- sage of the act."
