The following from the Angelica Every Week, demonstrates to what extent Allegany's next Assemblyman, Fred A. Robbins, enjoys the confi-dence and esteem of his townsmen:

Fred A. Robbins was first elected Supervisor of Angelics in 1889. That year the Democratic nomines for that year the Democrate office received a two-thirds Democrat ic vote of the town. For the four succeeding years of 1890, '91, '92 and '93 there has been no other nominee except Mr. Robbins, and not a single rote has been cast against him.

The pension authorities have new made a new order regarding the suspension of pensions. The new order says that no pension shall be suspend. ed where the records show that the pensioner has a just claim. No one year. can object to this ruling, but it seems to contain a practical admission that pensioners were stricken from the rolls under the previous order, whose papers showed they had a just claim. Whather those who under the former order were suspended are now to be restored is not stated. It is said the new order was made because a large number of suspensions were to be tested in the courts.

At the Republican County Convenvention of Chautauqua county, held in Savona. Mayville, last week Tuesday, Hon. S. F. Nixon of Westfield was nominated for Member of Assembly. Mr. Nixon was, until a day or two previous to his nomination, a candidate for the nomination for State Senator from this District. Upon learning that Allegany county would cast fifty votes for Charles A. Ball of Wellsville, and that Frank Higgins of Olean would receive a like number from the Cattaraugus county delegates, Mr. Nixon and his friends decided that he stood a poor showing in the Senatorial race, and consequently a strong and successful effort was made to nominate him for the Assembly. This candidate for Senator, and her fifty votes will doubtless be divided between Mr. Ball and Mr. Higgins. Allegany's chance for securing the nomination seems equal with that of Cattaraugus, and the delegates from this county will hardly do less than support Mr. Rall first and last, trusting that he will receive enough votes from Chautauqua county to nominate him. Let Allegany's delegates be true to their own county.


