At a meeting of the Allegany County Pub-
lishers' Association, held at Bolivar, April 23, 1892,
the following rules were unanimously adopted to
be in effect the week beginning May 9, 1892:

Rule 1.—That not less than 5 cents per line be
charged for resolutions of respect, and local no-
tices of entertainments from which revenue is to
be derived.
Rule 2.—Cards of thanks to be charged \$1.
Rule 3.—Obituary notices, except such as are
published as a matter of news, and lists of wed-
ding presents to be charged for at not less than
5 cents per line.

position, and also took several premi-
ums on Shropshire sheep.

ward M. Deems in this city Wednesday

At the Democratic caucus, held at
Prest's opera house last Saturday even-
ing, John Prest was elected Chairman,
and A. V. Durand, Secretary. P. De-
laney, Michael Dean, P. C. Lynch and
S. Keough, Jr., were elected delegates to
the County Convention, which will be
held in Friendship, Sept. 11th.

Water works contractor Birdseye

village. This will positively assure an
abundant supply of water for all pur-
poses. Work will begin on the line as
soon as the pipe can be procured.

Mr. James Owen's tannery was shut
down last night for an indefinite peri-
od, owing to the general depression in
trade. It is hoped Mr. Owen will be
able to start up again soon. He em-
ploys about a dozen hands, and the shut-
down cannot fail to affect the pocket-
books of nearly every business man in
Andover, to say nothing of Mr. Owen
and his employees.

The funeral of Mrs. Mary E. C., wife
of Dr. Mark Sheppard of Alfred Cen-
tre, took place last Thursday. Mrs.
Sheppard was a graduate of Alfred
University and a charter member of
the Athenaeum Society. She was a sis-
ter of Mr. A. W. Coon, a former And-
over resident, and was the author of a
number of most excellent poems, which
will soon be published in book form.

An order has been issued prohibiting
passengers from riding on the way
freights on the Erie. That will fix the
Alfred people so that they will have a
chance to walk to Andover to get
train 3.—Belmont Post. Train 3 ought
to stop at Alfred, and train 14 ought
to stop at Andover. The Erie's train
service will not have reached the per-
fection point until these two changes
are made.

R. G. Andrews, of Bolivar, a brother-
in-law of Mrs. H. E. Miner, of And-
over, died at his home in Bolivar, last
week. The deceased was 57 years of
age, and was a well known resident of
Bolivar. The funeral services were
held last Thursday, at the late home

ner, Mr. and Mrs. B. C. Cole, Mr. and
Mrs. John Diffin and Mr. William Diffin,
all of this place, attended the funeral.

The suit against R. A. Pease, which
was brought by the State dairy author-
ities has been discontinued by the
plaintiffs. Mr. Pease was charged with
adulterating his milk, because it failed
to stand a certain test which for some
time has been conceded to be too high.
Similar suits brought against other
parties have been carried to high courts,
and have invariably been decided in fa-
vor of the farmers, and the suit against
Mr. Pease was discontinued because it
was acknowledged that the same result
would follow in his case.
