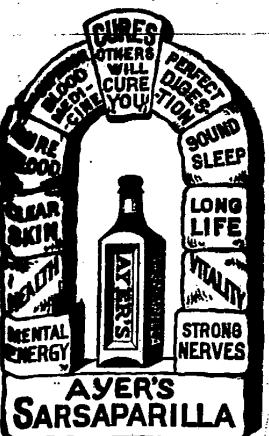

**THE ANDOVER NEWS.**

At a meeting of the Allegany County Publishers' Association, held at Bolivar, April 23, 1892, the following rules were unanimously adopted to take effect the week beginning May 9, 1892:

**RULE 1.**—That not less than 5 cents per line be charged for resolutions of respect, and local notices of entertainments from which revenue is to be derived.

**RULE 2.**—Cards of thanks to be charged \$1.

**RULE 3.**—Obituary notices, except such as are published as a matter of news, and lists of wedding presents to be charged for at not less than 5 cents per line.

The efforts to secure concerted action on the part of the depositors of the defunct Crane bank in Hornellsville, having failed, many of the individual creditors have taken steps to take the matter into the courts, says the Hornellsville Tribune.

A satisfactory contract was made last week by the Board of Water Commissioners with the Lake Shore Foundry of Cleveland, Ohio, for supplying the pipe for the Andover water works. A portion of the pipe was to have been shipped on Monday of this week, and the remaining the same and of some of the reservoir, will begin with in the next few days.

**Dances tomorrow night.**

Mr. George Wood of Greenwood has moved to this place, and occupies A. D. Brown's house next to the M. E. church.

At a special election held at Cohocton last week, \$22,500 was voted to put in a system of water works, and \$2,000 to build an engine house and lock-up.

Hon. A. C. Barney has been appointed Supervisor of the town of West Union in the place of T. A. McCormick, deceased. Mr. McCormick was also Justice of the Peace, and Robert McCormick was appointed to that office to fill vacancy.

The investigation into the conduct of the Elmira Reformatory by the State Board of Charities, which was to have begun yesterday has been postponed because of the illness of Deputy Attorney General Gilbert, who is to act as counsel to the committee. The investigation will not be begun for ten days yet.

The case of Dr. F. E. Comstock of this place vs. Benjamin Green of Alfred, was tried at County Court this week. The action, as most of our readers know, was brought to recover pay for medical services rendered to the defendant's deceased wife. After hearing the evidence for the plaintiff, Judge Norton ordered a non-suit on questions of law. This result was quite unexpected here, as the general opinion seemed to be that the doctor would receive a judgment in his favor.

A school was organized Sept. 4th, and formally opened Sept. 5th. The roster of teachers is as follows: B. B. Brown, Principal; Alice Whitney, Assistant; Elizabeth Baggett, Junior Department; Julia Meade, Intermediate; Mary Wilcox, Second Primary; Eva Richey, First Primary. The school rooms have been thoroughly renovated, two of the rooms newly seated, and all repairs necessary to make the rooms comfortable and pleasant have been made. A number of post-graduates are taking advantage of the classes in Solid Geometry, German, Caesar and English Literature.

**Last Thursday's Storm.**

Greater damage has been done in this vicinity by wind, hail and lightning than was caused by the storm which visited this section last Thursday afternoon between three and four o'clock, but it is safe to say that never in the history of this town were its inhabitants as thoroughly frightened by what they expected to pass through as they were at the above mentioned time. Threatening clouds, were observed all the afternoon, but it was not until about three o'clock that any real alarm was felt. At that hour could be seen approaching from the north-west, the blackest, most horrible-looking object that ever bore the name of cloud. It seemed to fairly roll along the ground, and the moment of contact was awaited with terror. Many people went into cellars, others got into feather beds, while others cannot tell exactly what they did. Upon one point all will agree—if that cloud had fulfilled its promise, the chances are we would not now be here to write this article, neither would anybody else be here to read it. It suddenly became as dark as midnight, the wind howled, rain and hail fell in torrents, lightning flashed and thunder pealed—and we got through it somehow. When all was over no material damage could be discovered. A bolt of lightning struck Hale Davis' house on the corner of Main and Greenwood streets and tore off a few clapboards. On the hills trees were uprooted and fences blown down. Some crops also were damaged, but the results of the storm were so insignificant in comparison with what was expected that we believe all are willing to report "no damage" and call it even.

The storm was general throughout this and neighboring counties. In many places serious damage was done to crops, buildings, orchards, etc.
