The Woman's Christian Temperance Union of Andover meets the first and third Thursday in each month.

The following instructions regarding a matter of great interest to women, seem particularly appropriate at this time and in this place:

What is at once a great privilege and a great responsibility lies just before us. Next November the School Commissioner Ballot will be, for the first time, generally used—or generally neglected—by the women of New York State.

It is, indeed, only fractional enfranchisement, but it has the "flavor" of the whole, and, widely exercised, this new prerogative will mean more than language can well express; not merely to the cause of equal franchise, but to that of equal compensation, in the schoolroom and elsewhere, and to every phase of the multifarious "woman question." "Equal pay at the shop and equal say at the polls" are more closely related than was at first recognized. Widely as these and other divisions of the subject may seem to differ in external aspect, the true interdependence is very close. There are greater and lesser areas, but they form one circle, the real circumference of "woman's sphere."

The new law makes women, for the first time in this State, participants in a general election on exactly the same terms with men, as far as this one office is concerned. Due care should be exercised not to confound the new law with the local school ballot or "school meeting" law, which has been in force for several years. Both laws wholly obliterate the sex line within the prescribed limits, but the special qualifications for school meetings are not required of men in county or State elections, and, therefore, are not required of women who, under the new law, vote for school commissioners.

Generally speaking, this partial franchise is conferred upon all adult women who are neither aliens, criminals, nor persons of unsound mind (otherwise we are still ranked politically with these unenviable classes) and who have not changed their legal residences within the prescribed limits of time—a year in State, four months in county, one month in election district. These comprise the "other qualifications required by law."

The law also requires voters to be previously registered. While registration in person does not appear to be imperative except in cities, the only way to absolutely proper registration is to apply for it in person before the Board of Registry in session Oct. 21st and 28th—the third and second Saturdays before election.

It is hoped that the different organizations of women may interest themselves in obtaining a full registry of the women of the town so that the influence of the mothers as well as the fathers may be felt in the coming election.
