**VICINITY NEWS.**

**A Few Things That Have Happened Within One or Two Hundred Miles of Here.**

Saturday afternoon, at Corning, the unveiling of the monument at St. Mary's Cemetery, in honor of the glass-blowers who were killed in the Ravena disaster, took place.

The postal authorities have arranged for a daily mail between Wellsville and Oswayo, the stage arriving here in the morning, and leaving about 2:30 o'clock in the afternoon.—Wellsville Reporter.

The contested will of the late Father James M. Early of Hornellsville, which has been in litigation since February, 1890, was admitted to probate Friday, by Surrogate Miller of Steuben county.

The Ingham university, established by the Ingham sisters at LeRoy in 1835, and one of the famous schools of America, having graduated 8,000 lady students, must be sold at auction to satisfy a \$40,000 mortgage.

Rev. Father Thomas D. Johnson, who for over five years past has been pastor of the Catholic church at Owego, died Monday at the Arnot-Ogden hospital in Elmira. The remains were taken to Owego for burial.

Mrs. Grummond of the town of Woodhull, celebrated her 103d birthday, last week, by walking two miles. She is in good health and does the housework for the family. She can read the newspapers, hear well, and enjoys good health.

Representative Hooker has introduced in the House a bill authorizing a pension of \$25 a month to Louisa Hall of Fillmore, Allegany county. Mrs. Hall is the aged widow of Asa Hall, a soldier of the war of 1812. He enlisted as a private in Capt. House's Battery, U. S. Artillery, and served for over two years.

During the severe storm, Friday, at Troupsburg, Burt Cornell and Anthony Johnson took refuge in a barn which was struck by lightning, and Mr. Cornell was instantly killed and Mr. Johnson was severely shocked. Mr. Cornell was 35 years old, and leaves a wife and four children. The barn and contents, including one horse, were burned.

A young man named W. A. Cutler, living in the town of Hartsville, near Canisteo, about twenty years of age and of good habits, and who had made a good record at the Canisteo Academy, started from his home on Sunday evening, August 28th, to go to church, and has not been heard of since. Later—the young man has been found in Wyoming county.

Erie O. Van Brocklin, Secretary of the Board of Fire Commissioners of Buffalo, who pleaded guilty to the charges of forgery and grand larceny last week was sentenced to eight years and five months in Auburn State Prison. Van Brocklin succeeded in stealing about \$80,000 from the city by carrying on the pay roll dummy firemen, and forging their pay warrants.

Superintendent Brockway of the Elmira Reformatory has relieved the board of managers of that institution of the responsibility of action upon the Governor's suggestion, by himself requesting of them that he be released from the duties and responsibilities of the superintendency of the institution pending the investigation. James B. Rathbone, one of the managers, will act temporarily as superintendent.

The excursion train on the River road struck a man asleep on the track near Duke's mill, Thursday night. The victim turned out to be Geo. Richardson of Oswayo, who had been to the Fair and getting on board of the train, wandered up the track and fell asleep. The train was running very slowly and was partially stopped before hitting the man. His head and shoulder were cut and bruised, but the extent of the injury is not yet known. The injured man was taken to the Forks.—Wellsville Reporter.

A few weeks ago the News published an item stating that several persons had contracted diphtheria at Kiantone, Chautauqua county, by kissing a bride who was suffering with sore throat, which afterward proved to be diphtheria. The death of Ransom Bratt occurred at his home in the town of Kiantone last week. The wife and only child of Mr. Bratt were buried a few days before. Diphtheria was the cause of death in each case, and the disease originated in the family from the Kiantone wedding-kissing case. It is a very sad case, the family being wiped out of existence, and having no very near relations.

Meager details of a serious shooting affray have been received from Austin, Pa. On Monday evening a man named Williams, a constable of Hulls, which is about in the center of Potter county, arrested one Thomas Kennedy at a lumber camp near by, called "Pig's Ear," for assault and selling liquor, taking the prisoner to Thomas Glover's place near Hulls, to change his clothing when Kennedy tried to escape. Thomas Glover caught hold of the constable to assist Kennedy in escaping, whereupon Williams and Kennedy opened fire. Twelve shots were fired in all, and Glover was shot in the bowels and died from the effects at noon. Constable Williams was seriously but not dangerously wounded in the neck. Kennedy escaped, it is thought, slightly wounded. It is not known who shot Glover. Kennedy is said to be a tough character. Glover formerly resided at Keating Summit, Pa.

**To Visit the Elmira Reformatory.**

An opportunity is to be given the newspaper men of this State to inspect the Elmira Reformatory on Thursday of this week. Public interest in this institution is just now very great, owing to the fact that its superintendent is under charges of cruelty to inmates, and the State Board of Charities will soon begin an investigation. The Elmira Advertiser says of the plans for giving newspaper men access to the Reformatory:

In view of the great interest at present centered in the Elmira Reformatory, and in order that newspaper men may become personally acquainted with the work of the institution, and at the same time have an opportunity to become acquainted with each other, the city editors of the Elmira papers have decided to issue an invitation to the city editors of all daily newspapers in this State, as well as the local and general editors of all weekly newspapers in New York and northern Pennsylvania, to visit Elmira on Thursday of this week to thoroughly inspect the Reformatory.

The electric railroad companies of this city have kindly volunteered to place cars at the disposal of the newspaper fraternity, and it is proposed to devote the forenoon to visiting the different points of interest in the city along the line of the Elmira and Horseheads railroad. In the afternoon a visit will be paid to the grounds of the Elmira Industrial Association, and at 2 p. m. the scribes will adjourn to the Reformatory, where a thorough and complete tour of the prison will be made, and an opportunity will be given to see 1,500 men at work at thirty different trades.

At 4:30 o'clock will occur the full dress parade of the Reformatory Regiment, which is considered by all military men one of the most picturesque sights ever presented. In the evening, the trade schools will be in session and all who can stay to see the men at work in these departments will find a happy surprise in store.

It should be distinctly understood that this is purely a newspaper affair, and not the suggestion of the Board of Managers, the Superintendent or any one connected with the institution. The idea originated with James R. Colburn of the Gazette, and he, with the other newspaper men, made all the preparations before the Board of Managers were made acquainted with the scheme.

**Fireman Donovan Killed.**

Patrick Donovan, fireman on engine 193—pusher between Wellsville and Tip Top—was instantly killed in the yard at Wellsville, about noon on Monday. He was on his way to his engine and stepping from the main track to a siding to avoid a passing train, was struck by a car pushed by switch engine 121. He was the youngest son of Patrick Donovan of Elm Valley, and was well known and highly respected. He was unmarried.
