ANDOVER, N. Y., Sept. 20, 1893.

The Portuguese authorities have declared New York to be a cholera infected port. The people of this country have no cause for alarm as long as the news comes by way of Portugal.

The Erie directors will meet, Sept. 21st, to discuss the proposed reorganization plan. It is said that the new bonds which have been suggested to replace the Erie seconds will not be larger in amount than the present issue, but provision for taking up the floating debt will probably be made by the issue of collateral trust bonds based on securities now in the treasury of the company. In regard to the rumors of President King's retirement, one of the directors is quoted as saying that he thought President King would resign after the company was again easy financially.

The Chinese question is all to be gone over again in Congress, it having been decided by the Administration that a substitute for the Geary law must be adopted. A bill embodying the ideas of the Administration, which was prepared by Mr. Quincy, who has just resigned the position of Assistant Secretary of State, it is said, under Mr. Cleveland's direction, and which was introduced by Representative Everett of Massachusetts, is now in the hands of the House Committee on Foreign Affairs, and although Mr. Geary, who is a member of that committee, does not like the bill, it will probably be reported to the House without material change.

There will be two days this fall for those living in the rural districts in which to register. There was an attempt made, last winter, to require all those who wished to vote to appear in person in order to be registered. But this effort failed in the Senate, so that the old law stands. This allows all of the names to be handed in to the registration board at its first meeting, whether they voted or not at the previous election. Those not so registered on the first day, must appear in person the second day of registration if they wish to vote. The same law applies to women, who have a right to vote for school commissioners. The days for registry are Oct. 21st and Oct. 28th.

## Drawing of Jurors.

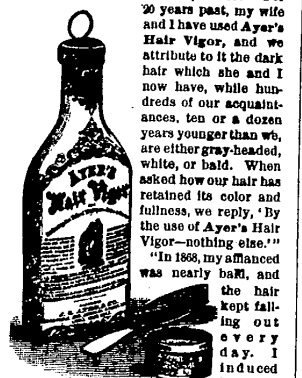
