Guinn Burned to Death in His

Last Saturday evening Thomas who lived about three miles easterly from Andover, was burned to death in his house. He had been in town that afternoon, and left for home about six o'clock very much intoxicated. Upon arriving home he went to bed and fell into a deep sleep. Upon reaching the burning building it was found that the fire had gained so great a headway that to enter the house was impossible. It is not positively known how the fire originated, but it seems to be the opinion of those who were present during the burning, that it caught from the chimney in the kitchen, as that portion of the house was the first to burn, and we understand the house has been afire twice before from the same cause.
