SAD CALAMITY.

Thomas Guinn Burned to Death in His
House Near This Village.

Last Saturday evening Thomas
Guinn, who lived about three miles
easterly from Andover, was burned to
death in his house. He had been in
town that afternoon, and left for home
about six o'clock very much intoxica-
ted. Upon arriving home he went to
bed and fell into a deep sleep. Shortly
after 8 o'clock neighbors discovered
that the house was on fire. Upon
reaching the burning building it was
found that the fire had gained so great
a headway that to enter the house was
impossible. Mrs. Guinn had been in
bed a short time, and was awakened
by the fire, which had been burning for
some little time. She made every
effort to rouse her husband and rescue
him from the terrible situation, but
being of small stature and delicate in
health she found herself unable to do
so and was compelled to leave him to
his fate in order to save her own life.

As soon as the flames had subsided
the charred remains were picked up
and taken to the home of Robert Con-
ley, where the funeral was held Sun-
day afternoon. Rev. G. M. Janes offi-
ciating.

Mr. Guinn was 52 years of age and
leaves no children. It is not positively
known how the fire originated, but it
seems to be the opinion of those who
were present during the burning, that
it caught from the chimney in the
kitchen, as that portion of the house
was the first to burn, and we under-
stand the house has been afire twice
before from the same cause.

The affair created much excitement
in this place, and cannot be regarded
as anything less than a terrible calamity.

Death of Mrs. Henry Bullard.

Mrs. Henry Bullard died suddenly
at about 11 o'clock this morning; at her
home in this village, aged 74 years.

Mrs. Pandora Walker.

Mrs. Pandora Walker, one of the old-
est inhabitants of Andover, after a
brief illness of pneumonia, died Friday
night, Sept. 29, 1898.

Formerly she lived in the town of
Andover and was a member of the
Baptist church, but going to reside
elsewhere, a letter was granted her in
1877. Last spring she came to And-
over with her granddaughter, Mrs.
Horace Williams, with whom she since
resided. She was a little over 80 years
old. Funeral services were held at the
house Sunday morning at 10 o'clock
and she was taken to Scio for burial.
Rev. Wayne Brewster officiated.

Farricide at Adrian.

Andrew Eveland, a man 60 years old,
was shot in the head Monday forenoon
at Adrian, a small village 10 miles east
of Hornellsville, by a revolver in the
hands of his son Allie, aged 25 years.
They were under the influence of
liquor and had been quarrelling. The
father threatened to break the boy's
head with a beer faucet, whereupon
Allie procured a revolver and fired one
shot at his father. The bullet struck
him in the forehead and lodged in the
brain. The crime was committed at
the Railroad House, kept by Mr. Eve-
land. Allie Eveland was taken to the
Bath jail Monday afternoon to await
the action of the grand jury.
