Death of J. D. Goodwin.

J. D. Goodwin, of North Clymer,
Chautauqua county, N. Y., son of Mr.
and Mrs. J. M. Goodwin, of this place,
died at his home Friday, Oct. 6, 1893,
aged 51 years. Mr. Goodwin sustained
a stroke of paralysis the Saturday pre-
vious to his death, and reports that
were received here concerning his con-
dition gave reason for the belief that
he could not long survive. The re-
mains were brought here for burial,
the funeral being held at the M. E.
church at 2 o'clock last Sunday after-
noon. Rev. J. Kenyon of Independ-
ence officiated. The church was well
filled with relatives, friends and ac-
quaintances of the deceased.

Mr. Goodwin was born in Andover,
and although he has not been a resi-
dent here in a number of years his fre-
quent visits to his old home have en-
abled him to retain many of the friend-
ships formed in youth. His first occu-
pation was that of telegraph operator,
and after serving a proper time at
that business, he assumed the more
responsible duties of station agent,
having served in that capacity at Dale,
Lyndon, Penn Yan, Canaseraga and
North Clymer. At Canaseraga he was
station agent of the Erie company for
fifteen years, leaving there about eight
years ago to go to North Clymer, where
he has since occupied the same posi-
tion at the Panama station of the W.
N. Y. & P. road.

Mr. Goodwin was a member of Sher-
man Lodge F. & A. M. He leaves a
wife, to whom he was married about
three years ago, also a father, mother,
one brother and one sister.

"Dwight," as he was familiarly called,
was a genial, open hearted man, mak-
ing friends wherever he was known.
His decease came a surprise to many
of his old friends in Andover, who will
all join in deepest sympathy for his
near relatives in the loss they have sus-
tained.

Mrs. Charles Freeborn.

Frances M., wife of Charles Free-
born, died at her home in this village,
Monday, Oct. 9, 1893, aged 43 years.
Mrs. Freeborn had been in ill health
for a year past, but it was not until a
short time before her death that her
condition became alarming. It is nearly
two weeks since she was taken sud-
denly worse, and the direct cause of
death was probably apoplexy or paraly-
sis. For nearly a week previous to her
death it was known that she could not
long survive.

The deceased leaves, besides a hus-
band, one daughter, Miss Minnie Free-
born; also four sisters and two broth-
ers, namely: Mrs. Lamont Woodcock,
Mrs. Lyman Ross and Miss Maud
Dutcher of Hornellsville; Mrs. Loren
Howe of Bradford; DeWitt Dutcher
of Andover; F. A. Dutcher of Hornells
ville. In addition to the above, is a
wide circle of relatives, friends, neigh-
bors and acquaintances, from whom
deepest sympathy will go out to the
members of the immediate family.
The funeral services were held this
afternoon at the M. E. church, Rev.
G. W. Gibson officiating.

Mrs. Henry Bullard.

Mary Ann, wife of Henry Bullard,
died at her late residence in this vil-
lage, Oct. 5, 1893, at about 11 o'clock a.
m. For a number of days she had not
been well, but no one thought that the
messenger of death was so near, and
when the summons came it was sudden
and unexpected. She was born in Mt.
Holly, Vermont, Jan. 16, 1819, and
when 4 years of age came with her par-
ents, Mr. and Mrs. James Adams, to
Andover, where she has lived nearly 70
years. They came with an ox team
and were 24 days on the road. At
twenty-five she became the devoted
wife of Henry Bullard. She leaves a
husband, four daughters and four sons,
the oldest daughter, Mrs. Cochrane, and
the youngest son having passed on be-
fore.

She early became a member of the
Methodist church, to which she has
been loyal these many years. Her life
has been given to her home and family
rather than society and the public.
The funeral was held at the Methodist
church at 2 p. m. Saturday, Rev. G. W.
Gibson officiating.
