VICINITY NEWS.

A Few Things That Have Happened With-
in One or Two Hundred Miles
of Here.

There are now two stage lines be-
tween Alfred Centre and Hornellsville.
James H. Stevens of Hornellsville is
the Democratic candidate for County
Judge of Steuben county.

Kirk Ingham, a former resident of
Belmont, is reported as having made
about \$100,000 on oil and gas leases in
West Virginia.

W. E. Chase, station agent at Alfred,
has gone to Oberlin, O., to resume his
studies in the theological department
of the college there.

Francis A. Macomber, Justice of the
Supreme court for the 7th judicial dis-
trict of this state, died at his home in
Rochester last Friday.

The National Commercial Travelers'
Home will be located in Binghamton,
it having been so decided at a meeting
held in Syracuse last week.

Miss Charlotte Jones and Miss Fran-
ces Richardson, both of Hornellsville,
have departed for a year's travel in
Egypt and other foreign countries.

The Hoffman pearl button factory
which it has been reported would be
removed from Hornellsville to Roches-
ter is to remain and run on a more ex-
tensive scale.

Walter Sessions, Jr., who was nomi-
nated by the independent element in
politics at Jamestown recently, has
withdrawn in favor of the Democratic
nominee, Irving Prescott.

An attempt was made Friday even-
ing to wreck Erie train number ten, at
Portage Bridge, N. Y. Ties fastened
upon the rails were discovered by the
engineer in time to stop the train, and
prevent what might have been a serious
accident.

Statistics have been collected from
every county in the state relative to the
apple crop. According to reports the
outlook for the crop is discouraging
and the harvest will not be more than
one-quarter of what it should be
throughout the state as a whole.

The tax levy shows that Allegany
County must pay into the state treas-
ury for school purposes \$13,907, for
general purposes \$19,975 and for state
care insane \$4,730. The county re-
ceived last spring from the state as
school money \$40,278—\$3,686 more
than the state tax.

James Brown, a carriage painter
living in Hornellsville, was found dead
at the foot of the stairs leading to a
gambling room in that city late last
Friday night. It was thought he had
ascended the stairs and not finding
anybody in the room had started
downstairs, but only went a few steps
when he fell to the bottom, fracturing
his skull.

A terrible wreck occurred on the
Michigan Central railroad at Jackson,
Mich., last Friday. The second section
of an excursion train ran into the rear
of the first section, which was standing
at the station. Thirteen persons were
killed and twenty injured. Among the
killed and injured were persons from
Elmira, Penn Yan, Bath, Hammonds-
port, Wheeler, Horseheads, and other
towns in the Southern Tier.

Harvey Taylor, colored man of
Bradford, bought a basket of grapes
the other day which contained a neatly
written note giving the name and ad-
dress of the girl who packed the basket
requesting the purchaser to send his
photograph and to correspond. The
idea pleased him greatly and he
says he will have his picture taken in
his band uniform and send it to the
young lady. She will undoubtedly be
tickled when she gets it.

Last Wednesday representatives from
the different organizations of firemen
in this county met at Wellsville and
organized the Allegany County Fire-
men's Association. Its object is to
increase and maintain interest in all
the departments throughout the county.

Belmont yesterday.
