VICINITY NEWS.

A Few Things That Have Happened With-
in One or Two Hundred Miles
of Here.

James H. Stevens of Hornellsville
has declined the Democratic nomi-
nation for County Judge of Steuben
county.

The postoffice at Avoca, N. Y., was
robbed last Monday night and about
\$100 in stamps were taken. The safe
was blown open.

At the recent races on the kite track
in Hornellsville, Egthorne, the noted
Friendship stallion, trotted a half mile
in 1:05, lowering his record one second.

There is good reason to believe that
the Delaware, Lackawanna & Western
railroad will shortly change hands.
The doubt is as to whether the Jersey
Central or the New York Central will
get it.

Last Friday morning, at Battle Creek,
Mich., two passenger trains collided
and twenty-six persons were killed and
as many more injured. Direct disobe-
dience of orders on the part of the
engineer and conductor of one of the
trains was the cause of the wreck.

Last Wednesday another attempt
was made to break jail at Angelica,
this time, however, without success.
The prisoners got possession of a piece
of sheet iron and made a saw, with
which they were sawing a piece out of
the floor, when they were discovered.

A dispatch to the Elmira Advertiser
says: Three miles southeast of Friend-
ship, on the J. C. Holden place, lives a
young man and his sister named
Glauche. About one o'clock last Wed-
nesday the young lady laid down to
rest and took a smell from a bottle of
chloroform for her head, which was
aching terribly. She evidently got an
overdose, as it was two days and two
nights before she recovered her senses.

Pickpockets on heavily loaded trains
to and from Chicago sprinkle chloro-
form over the car floors in the night,
and then proceed to "do up" the vic-
tims. One conductor on a train run-
ning east from Chicago said the other
day that it was a common occurrence
for the atmosphere in the cars on his
train to be impregnated with an an-
aesthetic, and he did not doubt that
the thieves did a paying business while
the passengers slept.

Last Friday's Wellsville Reporter says:
The little 6-year old son of night police
Thos. Moran, got possession of his
father's revolver a 32 calibre, yesterday
afternoon and proceeded to do some
banging all by himself. He removed
the cartridges, placing one of them in a
crack of the sidewalk and then struck
it with a hammer; the effect was start-
ling and the end of the little fellow's
thumb was blown off. It was an un-
fortunate experience but will probably be
a lesson the boy will not soon forget.

A special from Jamestown says:
The epidemic of diphtheria that has so
long raged in Jamestown is increasing
at an alarming rate, and from the pre-
sent outlook will continue all winter.
The pest house, which has so long been
talked of, has not as yet been estab-
lished, and this contagious disease
spreads from one member of the family
to another. Since spring about 150
deaths have occurred. At Friday
evening's meeting of the Board of
Health Officer Bowers reported 23 cases
of diphtheria for the week. This is
the largest number ever reported for
one week. Six deaths have occurred
from the disease during the week.

A dense fog began settling over the
city of Lockport last Thursday at 4 p.
m., and by 5 o'clock it became so thick
that it was impenetrable. Fogs were
experienced last year, but were as
nothing as compared with that of last
week. The electric lights were lit, but
did not show any more than a mere
candle. Many people returning from
work lost their way, drivers of wagons
were running into each other, and for
a time it looked as if some terrible ac-
cident would be chronicled. Many
farmers returning to their homes, it is
reported, lost their way. The streets
were deserted, except by the few who
were obliged to be out.

A \$6,000 Judgment.

The case of Nettie Royce vs. the
towns of Belfast and Angelica was
tried last week in the Supreme court
at Belmont. The suit was brought to
secure damages for injuries received
by the plaintiff from falling off the
unfinished transit bridge which unites
the above named towns. The jury
awarded the plaintiff a judgment of
\$6,000. Judge S. M. Norton of Friend-
ship was attorney for the plaintiff and
Richardson and Robbins of Angelica
appeared for the defendants. The
case will be appealed.

OTHER COURT NEWS.
The case of G. B. Dayton vs. the N.
Y. L. E. & W. R. R. Co., an action for
damage caused by the Erie killing cat-
tle near Wellsville, was tried. The
jury brought in a verdict for \$65, for
plaintiff.

The case of Caroline Blickway vs.
Morris Fitzgerald, a Belvidere breach-
of-promise suit, was dismissed because
the plaintiff failed to appear.

In the case of Marion Bullard vs.
Wm. Beever the jury awarded the
plaintiff \$300. Beever exchanged a lot
on Grove street in Wellsville for 160
acres of land in Kansas, giving Bullard
a deed for the same. Beever afterward
claimed to have exchanged only half
of the lot, and Bullard was unable to
collect rent of the parties occupying
the other half, so he sued for \$300
damages, which he recovered.

There were six criminal indictments
found by the grand jury. Two negroes,
Wilson Walters, Lewis Miller and a
Spaniard, Joseph Lewis, were each in-
dicted for two burglaries and breaking
jail. Sentenced five years for first
burglary, four years and six months
for the second and sentence suspended
for jail breaking.

Michael Callahan, two indictments,
pleaded guilty and sentenced five years
for burglary and four years for break-
ing jail.

James Keeting indicted for burglary
and jail breaking, pleaded not guilty.
Trial set down for Court of Sessions.

Martin Riley, indicted for resisting
an officer and breaking jail, pleaded
not guilty. Trial set down for Court
of Sessions.

Frank Allen and James Gillan held
for highway robbery at Scio, no indict-
ment found and discharged.

Miner Will Case Decision.

Last Friday the General Term of the
Supreme court handed down a decision
sustaining the decree of the Surrogate's
court in the case of the will of the late
A. W. Miner of Friendship. This is a
defeat for the contestants of the will,
who are brothers of the late Mr. Miner,
and unless the case is carried to a still
higher court, and the decision reversed,
Mrs. Wellman, Mrs. Corbin and Mrs.
Lockwood adopted daughters of the
late deceased, will get the bulk of the
property.
